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Opening Up America Again Testing Overview and Testing Blueprint

Today, President Donald J. Trump unveiled the *Opening Up America Again* Testing Overview (18-page slide deck) and Testing Blueprint (11-page guidelines) designed to facilitate State development and implementation of the robust testing plans and rapid response programs described in the President's *Opening Up America Again Guidelines*. The blueprint describes the roles and responsibilities, as well as core objectives, for the robust State testing plans and rapid response programs needed by States to safely reopen. To meet the country's testing needs, the blueprint describes a partnership between Federal, State, local, and tribal governments, and the private sector. As we continue to gradually open up our Nation, testing will be crucial to give the American people the confidence they need to resume their economic, social, and religious lives. This roadmap will help States maximize testing capacity and protect the health and safety of their people as we begin to reopen and beyond.

On April 16, the President unveiled the *Opening Up America Again Guidelines* (20-page slide deck; **Opening America**), a three-phased, data-driven approach based on the advice of public health experts to help State and local officials reopen their economies and get people back to work.

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President Trump and Vice President Pence led a discussion of best practices from our Nation's governors on *Opening Up America Again Testing Blueprint*, re-open strategies, expanded testing capacity, and supply chain management. Participants discussed the Guidelines for *Opening Up American Again* and *Opening Up America Again Testing Blueprint* including key gating criteria, core State preparedness responsibilities, and a data-informed, phased strategies. Several participants discussed the importance of close coordination with both health professionals, private sector partners and community

leaders. Governors shared best practices on leading their entire testing ecosystem, including scaling and utilizing all testing capacity, improving transparency on all testing options, and bolstering contact tracing and surveillance. The Federal government continues to provide supply chain support that is helping all states. Federal leaders continue to drive enhanced domestic production of key products, providing swift and thorough regulatory approvals, and continuing Operation Airbridge, which is supplementing commercial supply chain efforts to get critical supplies directly to the healthcare providers.

Federal, State, local, and tribal leaders continue to regularly highlight social distancing efforts and how they are incorporated into reopening phases.

Since January 2020, the Trump Administration has held over 190 briefings – including 16 governors' briefings – with over 90,000 State, local, and tribal leaders. Leaders at every level of government and the private sector are working in partnership to bend the curve and advance our Nation's economic revival.

State-Specific PPE & Testing Information

- **State & County-Level PPE Data**: Prior today's briefing, each governor and staff received updated (through April 24) State- and county-specific information on personal protection equipment (PPE) and other critical supplies being distributed to healthcare providers through the normal commercial supplier distribution system, which has been bolstered by Project Airbridge and additional commercial supply chain acquisitions. As of April 26, FEMA, HHS, and the private sector combined have coordinated the delivery of or are currently shipping: 74.7 million N95 respirators, 104.8 million surgical masks, 7.2 million face shields, 15 million surgical gowns, 798 million gloves, 10,603 ventilators and 8,450 federal medical station beds. *If you did not receive this information or need it re-sent please let me know.*
- State-by-State Testing Platform Information: Each governor and staff received State-by-State testing platform information that included State-specific high and low throughput machine location map and location details. The development of an integrated lab strategy in your State will allow for a more efficient use of diagnostic reagents, facilitate optimal workflows and workforce utilization, and provide more continuity of testing capacity with defined turnaround times for results. Rapid and efficient testing will help identify pockets of viral emergence and allow for rapid contact tracing and effective control. The Trump Administration has responded to the coronavirus threat by scaling up the largest testing system anywhere in the world. Starting from scratch, the Trump Administration has performed more than 5.4 million tests in less than 45 days – far more than any other nation. This is more total tests than the following nations combined: Australia, Austria, Canada, France, India, Japan, Singapore, Sweden, South Korea, and the United Kingdom. *FEMA in coordinating* with HHS, CDC, and FDA is holding follow-up state-by-state technical assistance calls in the coming week – please connect with your FEMA Regional Administration about this follow-up call.

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

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

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

Reminder - CMS Elective Procedure Guidance

As a reminder, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) issued guidance on non-essential elective procedures providing essential non-COVID-19 care to patients without symptoms of COVID-19 in regions with low and stable incidence of COVID-19. More details **here**.

Readout from the May 4, 2020 Governors Briefing

Today, Vice President Mike Pence led a discussion with the chief executives of approximately 53 States, territories, and the city of Washington, DC, and the White House Coronavirus Task Force to discuss updates on the all-of-America approach to respond to COVID-19 and drive America's economic revival in a phased approach.

Vice President Pence led a discussion of best practices from our Nation's governors on *Opening Up America Again Testing Blueprint*, re-open strategies, expanded testing capacity, and supply chain management. Governors were joined by **Dr. Eric Lander** (Ph.D.) with the Broad Institute in Massachusetts to discuss expanding COVID-19 testing efforts in the Boston metro area and **Dr. David Rubin** (M.D.) with the PolicyLab at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine to discuss his COVID-19 modeling research.

Governors shared best practices on leading their entire testing ecosystem, including scaling and utilizing all testing capacity, improving transparency on all testing options, expanding testing in nursing home and prisons, and bolstering contact tracing and surveillance. The Federal government continues to provide supply chain support that is helping all states. Federal leaders continue to drive enhanced domestic production of key products, providing swift and thorough regulatory approvals, and continuing Operation Airbridge, which is supplementing commercial supply chain efforts to get critical supplies directly to the healthcare providers including over 15,000 nursing homes.

Federal Emergency Management Agency Administrator Pete Gaynor provided an update on severe weather and hurricane preparedness efforts by local, State, tribal, and Federal leaders and highlighted **National Hurricane Preparedness Week** (May 3 through 9, 2020).

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- **PPE for Nursing Homes**: FEMA is coordinating two shipments totaling a 14-day supply of PPE to all 15,400+ Medicaid and Medicare-certified nursing homes in America to supplement regular supplies. The first shipments are expected to begin next week arriving first in hot spot communities later this week. The shipments show our continued commitment to work with State and local leaders to ensure some of our most vulnerable citizens in nursing homes. *A complete list of nursing homes receiving PPE and additional details about shipments to specific States will be provided shortly.* Additional details here.
- State-by-State Testing Supplies Information: Following technical assistance calls with your testing teams, HHS is providing details directly to your testing team on testing supplies (i.e., swabs, transport media) being distributed to your state to support enhanced testing efforts in May and coming months. This "air traffic control" effort also includes connecting you with testing platform manufacturers to address reagent needs. Commercial labs including LabCorps and Quest are also expanding testing to 5 million tests in May. If your state has not received those details from HHS, please let me know.

Guest Speaker Follow-Up Materials from Today's Briefing

- **David Rubin** (*M.D.*, *MSCE*, *PolicyLab* at *Children's Hospital of Philadelphia* and the *University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine*) presented on his COVID-19 modeling work in partnership with Gov. 
Introducing Making Contact: A Training for COVID-19 Contact Tracers

A new online course from the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials and the National Coalition of STD Directors

Today, the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO) and National Coalition of STD Directors (NCSD) announced the launch of a free, on-demand training for entry-level COVID-19 contact tracers. The course, *Making Contact: A Training for COVID-19 Contact Tracers*, will support ongoing public health agency efforts to prepare new contact tracers for their work of helping identify COVID-19 positive cases and those they've been in close contact with.

As the nation looks to restart the economy and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, our ability to quickly contain future outbreaks is more important than ever. To achieve this, state and local health agencies will need to rapidly scale up their contract tracing workforces. *Making Contact* provides approximately three hours of free online training to quickly teach participants the basics of contact tracing, regardless of prior experience in public health.

Participants will walk through the steps of contact tracing and interviewing, experience case-based scenarios, and complete knowledge exercises to reinforce important concepts. The course comes with helpful job aids, which will familiarize learners with frequently asked questions about COVID-19, fundamental components of contact tracing in a remote environment (over phone, video call), tips for conducting interviews, and more.



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- On **May 4**, FEMA <u>announced</u> \$200 million in supplemental funding from the CARES act for grants through its Emergency Food and Shelter Program.
 - Combined with the \$120 million in annual funding appropriated by Congress, a total of \$320 million will be distributed beginning in early June to human service organizations assisting those in need throughout the country.

 - Under the guidelines, states will need to meet six metrics that include demonstrating a downward trajectory of COVID-19 cases over a 14-day period and a robust system for testing health care workers before they can proceed to a phased opening.
 - The federal government will continue to work with governors across the country to ensure they have the equipment, supplies and testing resources to reopen safely and responsibly.
- On **April 22**, HHS launched <u>Telehealth.hhs.gov</u>. The site is a central source of information on telehealth resources and tools for patients and providers.
 - In his blog post "Health Providers: Join the Telehealth Revolution," the Surgeon General of the United States, Vice Admiral Jerome M. Adams M.D., M.P.H., outlines the benefits of using telemedicine tools.
 - Working from the safety of home, these tools allow clinicians to perform virtual visits, refill and adjust essential medications, and modify treatments that

will preserve and improve conditions that if left untreated, put patients at risk.

- As of **April 23**, FEMA, HHS, and the private sector combined have coordinated the delivery of or are currently shipping: 66.9 million N95 respirators, 105 million surgical masks, 6.7 million face shields, 14.9 million surgical gowns, 747 million gloves, 10,563 ventilators and 8,450 federal medical station beds.
 - FEMA continues to expedite movement of commercially pre-sourced and commercially procured critical supplies from the global market to medical distributors in various locations across the U.S. through <u>Project Airbridge</u>.
- The U.S. has now processed 4.9 million samples, which is more total tests than the following nations combined: Australia, Austria, Canada, France, India, Japan, Singapore, Sweden, South Korea, and the United Kingdom.
 - States should be making full use of the testing resources available to them, to include leveraging the full capacity available through commercial laboratories in addition to the capability provided through state laboratories.
 - HHS and FEMA have expanded items supplied by the <u>International Reagent</u> <u>Resource (IRR)</u> to help public health labs access free diagnostics supplies and reagents.
 - On **April 16**, the FDA <u>announced an expansion of testing options</u> through use of synthetic swabs with a design similar to Q-tips to test patients by collecting a sample from the front of the nose.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Pandemic: Whole-of-America Response

Attached you will find today's FEMA Daily Briefing Points for the Whole-of-America response to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. These briefing points include Topline Messages, as well as information on Supply Chain Task Force; By the Numbers; FEMA and Department of Health and Human Services Response; and Guidance from Federal Agencies.

Topline messaging includes:

- As of May 5, FEMA, HHS, and the private sector combined have coordinated the delivery of or are currently shipping: 86.1 million N95 respirators, 123.5 million surgical masks, 8.2 million face shields, 19.4 million surgical gowns, 948.6 million gloves, 10,663 ventilators and 8,450 federal medical station beds.
 - <u>FEMA is coordinating two shipments</u> totaling a 14-day supply of personal protective equipment to all 15,400 Medicaid and Medicare-certified nursing homes. The shipments are meant to supplement existing efforts to provide equipment to nursing homes.
- As of May 5, CDC, state, and local public health labs and other laboratories have tested more than 7.4 million samples.
 - HHS and FEMA have expanded items supplied by the <u>International Reagent</u>
 <u>Resource (IRR)</u> to help public health labs access free diagnostics supplies and
 reagents.
 - As of **May 4**, the FDA has issued 60 individual <u>emergency use authorizations</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories.

- While FEMA continues to lead the federal operations to the whole-of-America response to the pandemic, the agency continues to prepare for and respond to other disasters that may occur during this time.
 - This week is Hurricane Preparedness Week and there has been great interest in how FEMA is preparing to lead response and recovery efforts for additional disasters, such as hurricanes, during the COVID-19 environment.
 - FEMA has already responded to severe weather during this pandemic, with devastating tornadoes in the southeast, while the agency also prepares for the start of the 2020 hurricane season in just less than a month.
 - FEMA continues to take deliberate and proactive steps to safeguard our ability to respond and recover from future disaster that may arise during this pandemic.
- On April 27, President Trump unveiled the <u>Opening Up America Again Testing Overview</u> and <u>Testing Blueprint</u> designed to facilitate state development and implementation of the robust testing plans and rapid response programs described in the President's <u>Guidelines for Opening Up America Again</u>.
 - The President's Testing Blueprint sets forth the partnership between federal, state, local, and tribal governments, along with the private-sector and professional associations, all of which play important roles in meeting the Nation's testing needs.
- To support the Administration's <u>Testing Blueprint</u>, FEMA is working to source and procure testing material specifically, testing swabs and transport media.
 - The FEMA-sourced material will be provided to states, territories and tribes for a limited duration to help increase testing capacity in support of their individualized plans.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update: Daily Roundup

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration today continued to take action in the ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- The FDA and Federal Trade Commission (FTC) issued warning letters to two companies for selling fraudulent COVID-19 products, as part of the agency's effort to protect consumers. There are currently no FDA-approved products to prevent or treat COVID-19. Consumers concerned about COVID-19 should consult with their health care provider.
 - The first seller warned, <u>Honey Colony LLC</u>, offers products including "Quicksilver Liposomal Vitamin C w/ Liposomal," "Jigsaw Magnesium With SRT," and products labeled to contain silver, including "Silver Excelsior Serum", for sale in the U.S. with misleading claims that the products are safe and/or effective for the prevention and treatment of COVID-19.
 - The second seller warned, <u>Dr. Dhole's Sushanti Homeopathy Clinic</u>, offers products including "Homeopathic Genus Epidemicus" for sale in the U.S. with misleading claims that the product is safe and/or effective for the prevention of COVID-19.
- Yesterday, FDA approved two generic drugs indicated to facilitate tracheal intubation and to
 provide skeletal muscle relaxation during surgery or mechanical ventilation: succinylcholine
 chloride injection USP 200 mg/10 mL and cisatracurium besylate injection USP 20 mg/10 mL.
 FDA recognizes the increased demand for certain products during the novel coronavirus
 pandemic and we remain deeply committed to facilitating access to medical products to help
 address critical needs of the American public.
- Diagnostics update to date:
 - During the COVID-19 pandemic, the FDA has worked with more than 385 test developers who have said they will be submitting EUA requests to the FDA for tests that detect the virus.
 - To date, the FDA has issued 59 individual <u>EUAs</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories. In addition, 25 authorized tests have been added to the EUA letter of authorization for high complexity molecular-based laboratory developed tests (LDTs).
 - The FDA has been notified that more than 240 laboratories have begun testing under the policies set forth in our COVID-19 Policy for Diagnostic Tests for Coronavirus Disease-2019 during the Public Health Emergency Guidance.
 - The FDA also continues to keep its <u>COVID-19 Diagnostics FAQ</u> up to date.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update: Daily Roundup

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration Friday announced the following actions taken in its ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- The FDA issued an Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for the investigational antiviral drug remdesivir. The EUA allows for remdesivir to be distributed in the U.S. and administered by health care providers, as appropriate, to treat suspected or laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 in adults and children hospitalized with severe disease. Severe disease is defined as patients with low blood oxygen levels or needing oxygen therapy or more intensive breathing support such as a mechanical ventilator. Based on evaluation of the emergency use authorization criteria and the scientific evidence available, it was determined that it is reasonable to believe that remdesivir may be effective in treating COVID-19, and that, given there are no adequate, approved, or available alternative treatments, the known and potential benefits to treat this serious or life-threatening virus currently outweigh the known and potential risks of the drug's use. For more information see: news release, Health Care Provider Fact Sheet and Patient Fact Sheet.
- The FDA updated its <u>guidance</u> on convalescent plasma and associated <u>web page</u>. The updated guidance provides clarification for investigators on how to submit investigational applications for COVID-19 convalescent plasma. In addition, the guidance includes updated information regarding potential donors. Previously, the FDA's guidance noted that to qualify, individuals should have complete resolution of symptoms for 28 days or resolution for 14 and a negative diagnostic test. The revised guidance recommends that individuals have complete resolution of symptoms for at least 14 days prior to donation A negative lab test for COVID-19 disease is not necessary to qualify for donation. The revised guidance also clarifies that FDA does not recommend storing a retention sample from the convalescent plasma donation for single patient emergency INDs.
- Given the many questions people have about grocery shopping safety, the FDA has posted a video, <u>12 Tips for Grocery Shopping During the Pandemic</u>, to advise consumers.
- The FDA has also posted an updated <u>COVID-19 Response At-A-Glance Summary</u>. It contains updates on major agency activities as well as some important facts and figures.
- To help address shortages of continuous renal replacement therapy (CRRT) products during
 the COVID-19 public health emergency, the FDA issued an EUA to <u>Fresenius Medical Care</u> for
 emergency use of the multiFiltrate PRO System and multiBic/multiPlus Solutions. CRRT is a
 type of dialysis therapy used to filter and clean the blood when the kidneys are damaged or

are not functioning normally. The Fresenius multiFiltrate PRO System and multiBic/multiPlus Solutions have been authorized to provide CRRT to treat patients in an acute care environment during the COVID-19 public health emergency.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration yesterday announced the following actions taken in its ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- The FDA included, under the <u>ventilator emergency use authorization (EUA)</u>, a ventilator developed by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), which is tailored to treat patients with COVID-19. The ventilator was added to the list of <u>authorized ventilators</u>, <u>ventilator tubing connectors and ventilator accessories</u> under the ventilator EUA that was issued in response to concerns relating to insufficient supply and availability of FDA-cleared ventilators for use in health care settings to treat patients during the COVID-19 pandemic. The NASA VITAL (Ventilator Intervention Technology Accessible Locally) is intended to last three to four months and is specifically tailored for patients with COVID-19, by providing respiratory support for patients that are experiencing respiratory failure or insufficiency. The device is designed to be built with components outside the current medical device supply chain and therefore does not impact the existing supply chain of currently made ventilators.
- The FDA issued a Consumer Update, <u>Helpful Questions and Answers about Coronavirus</u> (COVID-19) and Your Pets, that provides answers to frequently asked questions. Based on the limited information available to date, the risk of pets spreading the virus that causes COVID-19 in people is considered to be low. At this time, there is no evidence that animals play a significant role in spreading the virus that causes COVID-19. There is a small number of animals around the world reported to be infected with the virus that causes COVID-19, mostly after having close contact with a person with COVID-19.
- The FDA issued a <u>guidance</u> highlighting flexibility under the Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA). This guidance is intended to facilitate the distribution of prescription drug products needed to respond to COVID-19, including drugs to treat symptoms of COVID-19. During the COVID-19 emergency, the DSCSA requirements related to certain product tracing and product identification activities, and wholesale distribution, do not apply to qualifying distribution activities. This flexibility balances the need for effective distribution of products under emergency conditions with protecting consumers from exposure to products that may be counterfeit, stolen or otherwise harmful.

- The FDA issued a Consumer Update, <u>Tips on Good Nutrition and Using the Updated Nutrition Facts Label During the Coronavirus Pandemic</u>. The update provides helpful tips on how to use the Nutrition Facts label to learn more about the foods you have on hand or are purchasing online or in stores, especially if you are purchasing different foods because of <u>temporary disruptions in the food supply chain</u> or are buying more canned or packaged foods instead of fresh.
- With support from the FDA's Office of Criminal Investigations and Office of the Chief Counsel, the U.S. Department of Justice <u>announced</u> today that a federal court in Utah has entered an injunction halting the sale of various silver products, promoted as treatments for COVID-19.
 - "The FDA will continue to help ensure those who place profits above the public health during the COVID-19 pandemic are stopped," said Judy McMeekin, Pharm.D., FDA
 Associate Commissioner for Regulatory Affairs.
 "We are fully committed to working with the Department of Justice to take appropriate action against those jeopardizing the health of Americans by offering and distributing products with unproven claims to prevent or treat COVID-19."
- The FDA granted accelerated approval to a new dosing regimen for a cancer therapy, to allow patients with certain cancers to continue treatment with fewer in-person visits. Specifically, the new dosing regimen allows patients to visit cancer centers less often while getting the treatment they need. This application was approved more than five months prior to the FDA goal date.
- The FDA issued an Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for SARS-CoV-2 Antibody Tests that have been evaluated in an independent validation study performed at the National Institutes of Health's (NIH) National Cancer Institute (NCI), or by another government agency designated by FDA, and are confirmed by FDA to meet the criteria set forth in the Scope of Authorization. Under this serology "umbrella" EUA, authorized devices are intended for use as an aid in identifying individuals with an adaptive immune response to SARS-CoV-2, indicating recent or prior infection, by detecting antibodies (IgG, or IgG and IgM, or total), as specified in each authorized device's instructions for use, to SARS-CoV-2 in human plasma and/or serum. Emergency use of the authorized devices is limited to the authorized laboratories certified under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 to perform moderate or high complexity tests. Authorized devices will be added to Appendix A and will be posted on the FDA's website.
- The FDA recently posted FAQs on Ventilators, including questions and answers related to the

- Enforcement Policy on Ventilators and Ventilators added to the "Umbrella" EUA, which added to the existing FAQs on Public Availability (Open Sourcing) of Ventilator Software and Design.
- The FDA also recently posted <u>FAQs on EUAs for Medical Devices During the COVID-19</u>

 <u>Pandemic</u>, including how to submit a request for a new EUA and what happens to authorized devices after the public health emergency is over.

 - The second seller warned, <u>Santiste Labs LLC</u>, the "Defend™ Patch," a transdermal patch containing a "composition of botanical oils," for sale in the U.S. with misleading claims that the product is safe and/or effective for the prevention or treatment of COVID-19.

Smoking cigarettes can leave smokers more vulnerable to respiratory illnesses such as COVID-19, which is why there's never been a better time to quit smoking. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration yesterday announced the following actions taken in its ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- The FDA issued a statement, "Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update: FDA Continues to Ensure Availability of Alcohol-Based Hand Sanitizer During the COVID-19 Pandemic, Address Safety Concerns," to discuss the Agency's efforts to increase availability of alcohol-based hand sanitizer and the importance of making hand sanitizer unpalatable to people, including children, through the use of denatured alcohol. Calls to the National Poison Data System last month related to hand sanitizer increased by 79 percent compared to March 2019, with the majority of these calls accounting for unintentional exposures in children 5 years of age and younger. The statement also warns consumers about hand sanitizer sold with fraudulent claims.
- The FDA developed a <u>fact sheet</u> in collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to help answer questions from the food and agriculture sector about what respirators, disposable facemasks, such as surgical or medical masks, or cloth face coverings are most appropriate for various settings.
- The FDA also developed a fact sheet, What to Do If You Have COVID-19 Confirmed Positive or Exposed Workers in your Food Production, Storage, or Distribution Operations Regulated by FDA, derived from CDC recommendations. This fact sheet summarizes key steps that employers and workers can take to help stay open, prevent and slow the spread of COVID-19, and support continuity of essential operations if workers are diagnosed with or exposed to COVID-19, or show symptoms associated with COVID-19.
- After receiving questions and concerns about the Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for face masks posted on April 18, 2020, the FDA <u>updated and re-issued the EUA</u>. In doing so, the FDA clarified that face masks, including cloth face coverings, that are authorized by the EUA are only authorized for use by the general public and health care personnel as source control. These face masks are not authorized to be personal protective equipment, meaning they are not a substitute for filtering face piece respirators or surgical face masks. The FDA also posted <u>FAQs on the Emergency Use Authorization for Face Masks (Non-Surgical)</u>.
- Diagnostics update to date:
 - During the COVID-19 pandemic, the FDA has worked with more than 380 test developers who have said they will be submitting emergency use authorizations (EUA) requests to FDA for tests that detect the virus.
 - To date, the FDA has issued 49 individual <u>emergency use authorizations</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories. In addition, 21 authorized tests have been added to the EUA letter of authorization for high complexity molecular-based laboratory developed

- tests (LDTs).
- The FDA has been notified that more than 225 laboratories have begun testing under the policies set forth in our COVID-19 Policy for Diagnostic Tests for Coronavirus Disease-2019 during the Public Health Emergency Guidance.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration yesterday announced the following actions taken in its ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- The FDA issued a guidance on non-invasive fetal and maternal monitoring devices to help increase the availability and capability of these devices used to support patient monitoring during the COVID-19 pandemic. These prescription devices include fetal dopplers that lay users (such as patients or caregivers) could be instructed to use in a home setting under the direction of a health care provider as well as other fetal and maternal monitoring devices that could be used by a health care provider in a home setting. Increasing the availability of these devices may increase access to important prenatal data without the need for in-clinic visits and facilitate patient management by health care providers while reducing the need for in-office or in-hospital services during the COVID-19 public health emergency.
- The FDA issued a <u>guidance</u> to help increase availability and capability of imaging systems needed for diagnosis and treatment monitoring of lung disease in patients during the COVID-19 pandemic. These imaging products include medical x-ray, ultrasound, magnetic resonance imaging systems, and image analysis software that are used to diagnose and monitor medical conditions. Increasing the availability of mobile and portable imaging systems may increase options to image patients inside and outside of healthcare facilities, which could help to reduce the spread of COVID-19.
- The FDA issued <u>guidance</u> to communicate its temporary policy regarding certain requirements under the FDA Food Safety Modernization Act Accredited Third-Party Certification Program for foreign food entities and their products. The guidance addresses the current challenges with conducting onsite monitoring activities during the COVID-19 public health emergency by providing temporary flexibility so that recognized accreditation bodies (ABs) can maintain the accreditations of certification bodies (CBs), and so that already-issued certifications need not lapse, where certain safeguards are in place. - The FDA's <u>Best Practices for Retail Food Stores</u>, <u>Restaurants</u>, and <u>Food Pick-Up/Delivery Services During the COVID-19 Pandemic</u>, is now available in <u>Spanish</u>.
- Diagnostics update to date:
 - During the COVID-19 pandemic, the FDA has worked with more than 360 test developers who have said they will be submitting emergency use authorizations (EUA) requests to FDA for tests that detect the virus.
 - To date, the FDA has issued 44 individual <u>emergency use authorizations</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories. In addition, 18 authorized tests have been added to the EUA letter of authorization for high complexity molecular-based laboratory developed

- tests (LDTs).
- The FDA has been notified that more than 220 laboratories have begun testing under the policies set forth in our COVID-19 Policy for Diagnostic Tests for Coronavirus Disease-2019 during the Public Health Emergency Guidance.
- The FDA also continues to keep its <u>COVID-19 Diagnostics FAQ</u> up to date.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration today continued to take action in the ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- Today, the FDA issued an immediately in effect guidance Notifying the Center for Devices and Radiological Health of a Permanent Discontinuance or Interruption in Manufacturing of a Device Under Section 506J of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. This <u>guidance</u> is intended to assist manufacturers in providing FDA timely, informative notifications about changes in the production of certain medical device products that will help the Agency prevent or mitigate shortages of such devices during the COVID-19 public health emergency. On May 11, 2020, the FDA will host a <u>webinar for medical device manufacturers and others</u> interested in learning more about the guidance.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update: FDA Continues to Ensure Availability of Alcohol-Based Hand Sanitizer During the COVID-19 Pandemic, Addresses Safety Concerns

Agency Additionally Warns Consumers about Hand Sanitizer Sold with Fraudulent Claims

Today, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration provided an update on its efforts to ensure the availability of alcohol-based sanitizer to help meet the demand for hand sanitizer during the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result of the agency's significant flexibility, more than 1,500 additional manufacturers have registered with the agency to produce hand sanitizer. At the same time, the agency is addressing safety concerns related to products being sold that are not in line with the FDA's policy and others being marketed with unproven claims.

"We appreciate industry's willingness to help supply alcohol-based hand sanitizer to the market to meet the increasing demand for these products and are grateful for their efforts," said FDA Commissioner Stephen M. Hahn, M.D. "With this increased supply comes our continued mission to ensure safety of these products. It is important that hand sanitizer be manufactured in a way that makes them unpalatable to people, especially young children, and that they are appropriately labeled to discourage accidental or intentional ingestion.

Additionally, hand sanitizers are not proven to treat COVID-19, and like other products meant for external use, are not for ingestion, inhalation, or intravenous use."

Following the FDA's guidance aimed at increasing availability of alcohol-based hand sanitizers, the agency has received feedback and questions over the past few weeks from industry and congressional members, particularly regarding the need to use denatured alcohol for these products. Adding these denaturants to the alcohol renders the product more bitter and less appealing to ingest, particularly for young children. While the agency understands the economic and business reasons behind foregoing this step in the manufacturing process, such an approach undermines the agency's mission of helping to ensure the safety of FDA-regulated products for consumer use, which is the FDA's top priority. This approach is consistent with the FDA's policies prior to the COVID-19 pandemic on including denatured alcohol in hand sanitizer and is even more important now as more consumers rely on its use as a mitigation tool against the deadly virus.

To illustrate the importance of using denatured alcohol and, according to an FDA analysis of data provided by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the American Association of Poison Control Centers surveillance team, calls to the National Poison Data System last month related to hand sanitizer increased by 79% compared to March 2019. The majority of these calls were for unintentional exposures in children 5 years of age and younger. Every year, there are hundreds of calls to poison control centers regarding exposure to hand sanitizer, many of which result in adverse events, including death. Unfortunately, ingestion of only a small amount of hand sanitizer may be potentially lethal in a young child.

This month, the agency received an adverse event report of a 13-year-old child drinking hand sanitizer packaged in a liquor bottle from a distiller. The sanitizer was not denatured and was reported to taste like normal drinking alcohol. To protect consumers, especially children, it is important to make hand sanitizer unpalatable.

The FDA also found that the product ingested by the 13-year-old child was not consistent with the labeling component of the agency's temporary policy— underscoring the importance that these products include a Drug Facts Label, warnings to keep the product out of reach of children, information to get medical help or call a poison control center right away if swallowed and to supervise use in children under 6 years of age to prevent accidental swallowing. These safety measures apply regardless of where the product is intended to be used, as it can easily be distributed beyond the original intended setting.

The FDA is also concerned about hand sanitizer products being sold by some manufacturers during the COVID-19 pandemic with unproven claims. Last week, the agency issued its first warning letter for a hand sanitizer product marketed with unproven COVID-19-related claims, in violation of federal law. The letter was issued to Prefense_LLC for selling their product with misleading claims, for example, "Prefense_protects you from germs with just one application per day! It's like wearing an invisible glove." The company's webpage also states that Prefense can, "protect you from pathogens up to 24 hours or for 10 hand washes." The FDA is not aware of any evidence that hand sanitizer products can protect consumers for 24 hours or after multiple hand-washings. These types of claims may put consumers at risk by leading to a false sense of security and resulting in infrequent hand washing or hand sanitizing. The agency urges consumers to be vigilant of products sold with misleading, unproven claims, by following our updates on our website.

The FDA remains committed to working with manufacturers, compounders, state boards of pharmacy and the public to increase the safe supply of alcohol-based hand sanitizer available to Americans, as well as continuing to take appropriate action against manufacturers making unproven claims.

Today, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is providing an update on the agency's efforts to combat the extremely concerning actions by companies and individuals that are exploiting or taking advantage of widespread fear among consumers during the COVID-19 pandemic. In response to scammers on the internet selling unproven medical products, the FDA has taken – and continues to take – a number of steps to find and stop those selling unapproved products that fraudulently claim to mitigate, prevent, treat, diagnose or cure COVID-19.

"While we seek to ensure access to critical medical products, it is imperative that we continue our efforts to find and prevent the sale and distribution of products that may be harmful to the public health. Americans can rest assured that we're leveraging our experience investigating, examining, and reviewing medical products, both at the border and within domestic commerce, to help ensure that the critical resources reaching the frontlines in the battle against COVID-19 are appropriate," said FDA Associate Commissioner for Regulatory Affairs Judy McMeekin, Pharm.D. "We take seriously our responsibility to determine whether the medical products coming into our country are

fraudulent, counterfeit or illegitimate, and take action as needed."

To date, the FDA has issued 42 <u>warning letters</u> to companies making bogus COVID-19 claims, including one to a seller of fraudulent chlorine dioxide products, equivalent to industrial bleach, frequently referred to as "Miracle Mineral Solution" or "MMS", as a treatment for COVID-19. After the seller refused to take corrective action, a federal court issued a <u>temporary injunction</u> requiring the seller to immediately stop distributing its unproven and potentially dangerous product.

Additionally, as part of the FDA's *Operation Quack Hack*, in just a few short weeks, the agency has discovered hundreds of such products including fraudulent drugs, testing kits and personal protective equipment (PPE) sold online with unproven claims. We continue to work with online marketplaces, domain name registrars, payment processors and social media websites to remove from their platforms products that fraudulently claim to mitigate, prevent, treat, diagnose or cure COVID-19 and to keep those products from reappearing under different names. At this time, the FDA has sent hundreds of abuse complaints to domain name registrars and internet marketplaces, who in most instances, have voluntarily removed the identified postings. We will continue to monitor the online ecosystem for fraudulent products peddled by bad actors seeking to profit from this global pandemic. We encourage anyone aware of suspected fraudulent medical products for COVID-19 to report them to the FDA.

There are a number of examples of unproven products that the FDA is keeping out of the country. Recently, the agency intercepted and investigated a <u>case</u> of mislabeled COVID-19 "treatment kits" offered for import. As a result, Special Agents with the FDA's Office of Criminal Investigations, with the help of domestic and international law enforcement counterparts in the United Kingdom, led the Department of Justice to bring a criminal complaint against a British man who sought to profit from this pandemic and jeopardize public health.

Until the curve is flattened, and even after, the FDA will continue to carry out the agency's mission of protecting the health and safety of American consumers and strive to prevent unlawful FDA-regulated products from entering, or being distributed in, domestic commerce.

Today, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration <u>issued an emergency use authorization</u> for the investigational antiviral drug remdesivir for the treatment of suspected or laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 in adults and children hospitalized with severe disease. While there is limited information known about the safety and effectiveness of using remdesivir to treat people in the hospital with COVID-19, the investigational drug was shown in a clinical trial to shorten the time to recovery in some patients.

"FDA's emergency authorization of remdesivir, two days after the National Institutes of Health's clinical trial showed promising results, is a significant step forward in battling COVID-19 and another example of the Trump Administration moving as quickly as possible to use science to save lives," said HHS Secretary Alex Azar. "NIH, FDA, and scientists across America and around the world have worked tirelessly with patients to get us this new potential treatment for COVID-19. The seamless cooperation between government and private industry under the President's all-of-America approach to COVID-19 is getting treatment options to patients in record time."

The emergency use authorization allows for remdesivir to be distributed in the U.S. and administered intravenously by health care providers, as appropriate, to treat suspected or laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 in adults and children hospitalized with severe disease. Severe disease is defined as patients with low blood oxygen levels or needing oxygen therapy or more intensive breathing support such as a mechanical ventilator.

"From day one, the FDA has been committed to expediting the development and availability of potential COVID-19 treatments. Today's action is an important step in our efforts to collaborate with innovators and researchers to provide sick patients timely access to new

therapies where appropriate, while at the same time supporting research to further evaluate whether they are safe and effective," said FDA Commissioner Stephen M. Hahn, M.D. "There's tremendous interest among all parties to identify and arm ourselves with medicines to combat COVID-19, and through our <u>Coronavirus Treatment Acceleration Program</u>, the FDA is working around-the-clock and using every tool at our disposal to speed these efforts."

Based on evaluation of the emergency use authorization criteria and the scientific evidence available, it was determined that it is reasonable to believe that remdesivir may be effective in treating COVID-19, and that, given there are no adequate, approved, or available alternative treatments, the known and potential benefits to treat this serious or life-threatening virus currently outweigh the known and potential risks of the drug's use.

The EUA also requires that fact sheets that provide important information about using remdesivir in treating COVID-19 be made available to health care providers and patients, including dosing instructions, potential side effects and drug interactions. Possible side effects of remdesivir include: increased levels of liver enzymes, which may be a sign of inflammation or damage to cells in the liver; and infusion-related reactions, which may include low blood pressure, nausea, vomiting, sweating, and shivering.

Following the declaration by the Secretary of HHS that circumstances exist justifying the emergency use of unapproved products, the FDA may issue an emergency use authorization to allow unapproved medical products or unapproved uses of approved medical products to be used in an emergency to diagnose, treat, or prevent serious or life-threatening diseases or conditions caused by chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear threats when there are no adequate, approved, and available alternatives.

The issuance of an EUA is different than FDA approval. In determining whether to issue an EUA, the FDA evaluates the available evidence and carefully balances any known or potential risks of any unproven products with any known or potential benefits of making them available during the emergency.

The EUA was issued to Gilead Sciences Inc. The FDA previously allowed for study of the investigational drug under clinical trials, as well as expanded access use for individual patients and through a multi-patient expanded access program coordinated by Gilead.

The EUA will be effective until the declaration that circumstances exist justifying the authorization of the emergency use of drugs and biologics for prevention and treatment of COVID-19 is terminated and may be revised or revoked if it is determined the EUA no longer meets the statutory criteria for issuance.

The FDA, an agency within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, protects the public health by assuring the safety, effectiveness, and security of human and veterinary drugs, vaccines and other biological products for human use, and medical devices. The agency also is responsible for the safety and security of our nation's food supply, cosmetics, dietary supplements, products that give off electronic radiation, and for regulating tobacco products.

This morning, the FDA revised its policy to improve antibody testing quality. The <u>revised policy</u> is entitled, "Policy for Coronavirus Disease-2019 Tests During the Public Health Emergency (Revised): Immediately in Effect Guidance for Clinical Laboratories, Commercial Manufacturers, and Food and Drug Administration Staff." FDA is issuing this guidance to provide a policy to help accelerate the availability of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) tests developed by laboratories and commercial manufacturers for the duration of the public health emergency. This guidance describes a policy for laboratories and commercial manufacturers to help accelerate the use of tests they develop in order to achieve more rapid and widespread testing capacity in the United States. Under the new policy, FDA expects commercial manufacturers to submit Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) requests, including their validation data, within 10 days of publication of the updated policy or the date they notify FDA of their test validation, whichever is later. FDA has also issued several documents with more information:

FDA's Intergovernmental Affairs staff would like to bring your attention to a revised Emergency Use Authorization for disposable filtering facepiece respirators manufactured in China that do not meet NIOSH standards. FDA is concerned that certain filtering facepiece respirators manufactured in China may not provide consistent and adequate respiratory protection to health care personnel exposed to COVID-19. These concerns are based on test results from the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) showing that some of these respirators did not meet the expected performance criteria of greater than or equal to 95 percent particulate efficiency. The revised EUA includes an updated appendix that lists the respirators that have been authorized for use in health care settings by health care providers (HCPs) to prevent exposure to SARS-CoV-2. The appendix was updated to remove certain respirators that are no longer authorized under the EUA.

FDA today also issued a <u>Letter to Health Care Providers</u>, which describes:

- Changes to the FDA's Emergency Use Authorization for respirators manufactured in China and removal of some of these respirators from the Appendix listing authorized respirators.
- Considerations for health care organizations when using or purchasing respirators.
- Actions the FDA has taken to help ensure the quality of respirators.
- Instructions for reporting problems with respirators to the FDA.

Good afternoon-

FDA's Intergovernmental Affairs (IGA) team wanted to share with you that today the Agency updated three guidance documents to reflect the new Sept. 9th premarket review submission date and new statutory minimum age of sale for tobacco products.

On July 12, 2019, the United States District Court for the District of Maryland ordered FDA to require manufacturers of e-cigarettes, cigars and other deemed new tobacco products that were on the market as of Aug. 8, 2016 to submit applications for premarket review by May 12, 2020. Last week, the court granted FDA's request for a 120-day extension – which FDA made solely as a result of the coronavirus pandemic – for manufacturers subject to the May 12, 2020 date. Applications that were originally due on May 12, 2020 are now due Sept. 9, 2020.

FDA strongly encourages applicants who are able to submit applications in advance of the Sept. 9 deadline to do so as soon as possible. Those who plan on submitting applications for a large number of products are encouraged to contact the agency as soon as possible to discuss their plans and method of submission. To help manufacturers preparing and submitting tobacco product applications by Sept. 9, FDA recently posted a compilation of information and resources on FDA's website.

In accordance with this new date for submission of premarket applications to the Agency and the new statutory minimum age of sale for tobacco products, today FDA issued changes to three guidance documents:

1. Enforcement Priorities for Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS) and Other Deemed Products on the Market Without Premarket Authorization FDA revised the guidance for industry, "Enforcement Priorities for Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS) and Other Deemed Products on the Market Without Premarket Authorization (Revised)." This is a revision to the January 2020 guidance which describes, among other things, how FDA intends to prioritize its enforcement resources with regard to ENDS products that do not have premarket authorization.

<u>The guidance</u> outlines FDA's intention to prioritize, as of Feb. 6, 2020, earlier enforcement against certain illegally marketed ENDS products that may be used by or appeal to youth. The guidance also originally stated that FDA intends to independently prioritize enforcement for any other ENDS product that was on the market as of Aug. 8, 2016 that is offered for sale after May 12, 2020, and for which the manufacturer has not

submitted a premarket application (or after a negative action by FDA on a timely submitted application). The guidance also set forth FDA's enforcement priorities for other deemed new tobacco products beginning May 12, 2020. The date for prioritized enforcement of premarket requirements for these products without a submitted application (excluding ENDS subject to earlier enforcement) has now been changed to Sept. 9, 2020.

The revised guidance does not in any way alter the fact that it is illegal to market any new tobacco product without premarket authorization. FDA is continuously evaluating new information and adjusting its enforcement priorities in light of the best available data, and it will continue to do so. FDA will take appropriate action regarding tobacco products that are marketed without premarket authorization, including as warranted based on changed circumstances, new information, or to better address minors' use of those products.

2. FDA Deems Certain Tobacco Products Subject to FDA Authority, Sales and Distribution Restrictions, and Health Warning Requirements for Packages and Advertisements

FDA revised the guidance for small businesses, "FDA Deems Certain Tobacco Products Subject to FDA Authority, Sales and Distribution Restrictions, and Health Warning Requirements for Packages and Advertisements (Revised)*." This Small Entity Compliance Guide is intended to help small businesses understand and comply with FDA's Deeming Rule. FDA revised this guidance to reflect the new premarket review submission deadline of Sept. 9, 2020 for new deemed tobacco products on the market as of Aug. 8, 2016. The revisions also include updates to reflect that the federal minimum age of sale of tobacco products has been increased to 21, and that FDA has been instructed to issue a final rule to, among other things, update all references to persons younger than 18 years of age to 21.

3. Extension of Certain Tobacco Product Compliance Deadlines Related to the Final Deeming Rule

FDA withdrew the guidance, "Extension of Certain Tobacco Product Compliance Deadlines Related to the Final Deeming Rule" which was originally issued in May 2017. FDA withdrew the guidance because the compliance deadlines contained in the guidance have passed, have been vacated or stayed, or are otherwise described in other guidance.

FDA Warns Manufacturers and Retailers to Remove Certain E-cigarette Products Targeted to Youth from the Market

Agency Continues to Target the Sale of Unauthorized, Flavored E-cigarette Products That Appeal to Youth

Today, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration issued ten warning letters to retailers and manufacturers who sell, manufacture and/or import unauthorized electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS) products targeted to youth or likely to promote use by youth. The warning letters were sent to establishments marketing unauthorized products, such as a backpack and sweatshirt designed with stealth pockets to hold and conceal an e-cigarette, ENDS products that resemble smartwatches, or devices appearing as children's toys such as a portable video game system or fidget spinner. Warning letters were also issued to companies marketing e-liquids that imitate packaging for food products that often are marketed and appeal to youth, such as

candy, or feature cartoon characters like SpongeBob SquarePants.

These warning letters are part of the <u>FDA's ongoing enforcement efforts</u> against ENDS and other deemed tobacco products illegally on the market. The warning letters are also in line with the agency's stated <u>enforcement priorities</u> against any ENDS product targeted to youth or likely to promote use by youth. If the recipients of these warning letters do not cease the manufacture, distribution and/or sale of these unauthorized tobacco products, they risk additional FDA action such as an injunction, seizure and/or civil money penalty actions.

"The FDA is focused on manufacturers and retailers that make and sell ENDS products that are targeted to youth and increase their appeal. The public should really be outraged by these products. The FDA is especially disturbed by some of these new products being marketed to children and teens by promoting the ease with which they can be used to conceal product use, which appeals to kids because it allows them to conceal tobacco product use from parents, teachers, law enforcement or other adults," said Mitch Zeller, J.D., director of the FDA's Center for Tobacco Products. "Even in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, we have not lost our focus on protecting youth against the dangers of e-cigarettes and will do everything we can to take action. These warning letters should send a clear message to all tobacco product manufacturers and retailers that the FDA is keeping a close watch on the marketplace. If you're marketing or selling these products to youth, the FDA will not tolerate it."

The following retailers and/or manufacturers or importers received a warning letter:

- Vaprwear Gear, LLC (manufacturer, online retailer)
- Vapewear, LLC (manufacturer, online retailer)
- Wizman Limited (manufacturer, online retailer)
- EightCig, LLC (online retailer)
- Ejuicepack, LLC (online retailer)
- Vape Royalty, LLC (online retailer)
- VapeCentric, Inc. (online retailer)
- Dukhan Store (online retailer)
- VapeSourcing (online retailer)
- Shenzhen Uwell Technology Co., Ltd. d/b/a DTD Distribution Inc. (importer, retailer)

These products appeal to youth in the way they are designed and labeled. For example, Vaprwear Gear's pullover and backpack products hold pod systems that deliver vapor through hosing discreetly woven through hidden pockets. This design allows the products to be used for vaping without raising the attention of parents, teachers or other adults. Similarly, the Vapewear vWaTch Starter Kit, Wizman Puff Boy Mod and VooPoo Rota 340mAh Pod System Kit look like products that are popular with kids, such as smartwatches, video game systems and fidget spinners, that can be carried or worn without revealing they are tobacco products. Under the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (FD&C Act), all these products are considered tobacco products because they are made or derived from tobacco and intended for

human consumption or components or parts of such products. Images and additional details of each product are included in the individual warning letters <u>available on</u> CTP's website.

The FDA has also issued warning letters to <u>73 brick-and-mortar retailers</u> for selling unauthorized flavored, cartridge-based ENDS products. This <u>follows 22 warning</u> <u>letters that FDA issued last month</u> for similar violations to online and brick-and-mortar retailers and manufacturers across the country. These warning letters are part of a series of ongoing actions consistent with the FDA's recently issued <u>policy of enforcement priorities</u> for e-cigarettes and other deemed products on the market.

Last month, in line with the agency's actions to protect the health and well-being of staff during the COVID-19 outbreak, the FDA issued a partial stop work order to the entities the agency contracts with at the state level for activities such as compliance checks and vape shop inspections. The inspections related to the actions announced today occurred before the stop work order. The FDA continues to evaluate the effect of COVID-19 on its programmatic activities and will continue to communicate any changes as they occur. Guided by health and safety considerations, the FDA will continue taking appropriate actions, as outlined by its priorities, on a rolling basis.

These warning letters notify the retailers and manufacturers that new ENDS products without a marketing authorization order are adulterated and misbranded, and selling or distributing these products to customers in the U.S. is prohibited under the FD&C Act. Retailers and distributors are encouraged to communicate with their suppliers to discuss possible options for the unauthorized products in their inventory.

Additionally, as part of the agency's efforts, the FDA has issued import alerts (here and here) for unauthorized tobacco products, including certain unauthorized ENDS products, imported into the U.S. informed by the agency's enforcement priorities outlined in FDA's guidance. Adulterated and misbranded tobacco products offered for import into the United States are subject to detention and refusal of admission. The FDA has also issued letters to more than 110 companies seeking information about the legal marketing status of more than 140 ENDS products.

Ultimately, manufacturers that intend to continue marketing any deemed, new tobacco product on the market as of Aug. 8, 2016—including ENDS products—must submit an application to the FDA by Sept. 9, 2020 that demonstrates that the product meets the applicable standard in the law, such as whether the product is appropriate for the protection of the public health. This date was recently extended (from May 12, 2020) due to the impact of the coronavirus pandemic. As a resource for manufacturers preparing and submitting tobacco product applications for new deemed products, the FDA recently launched a new webpage to provide a single location for all relevant information, including tips and resources on the application submission processes. For certain deemed tobacco products, the FDA is already prioritizing its enforcement, as outlined in its guidance on enforcement priorities for ENDS and other deemed tobacco products.

All of these efforts, in addition to enforcement of the new law <u>raising the federal</u> <u>minimum age for sale of tobacco products from 18 to 21 years</u> and the recent

expansion of the FDA's <u>public education campaign</u> to include videos featuring teenagers sharing cautionary tales about their e-cigarette addiction, are aimed at keeping these products out of the hands of youth. The agency also recently released <u>new resources with ScholasticExternal Link Disclaimer</u> for middle and high-school educators and school administrators. The materials, which include new lessons, worksheets and videos, are available online for free and are adaptable for virtual learning.

The FDA continues to monitor youth use of all e-cigarette products and will continue to expand its public education efforts and use the agency's regulatory authority—changing course as necessary—to further ensure all tobacco products, and e-cigarette products in particular, are not marketed to, sold to, or used by youth.

FEMA Announces \$200 Million for the Emergency Food and Shelter Program

FEMA announced that the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP) National Board will allocate \$200 million to communities across the country to assist organizations providing critical resources to people with economic emergencies, including our nation's hungry and homeless populations.

These funds were appropriated in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act to ease financial hardship caused by the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. Funding will go to organizations dedicated to feeding, sheltering, and providing critical resources to people experiencing, or at-risk of experiencing, hunger and homelessness. In addition to the \$200 million supplemental funding from the CARES Act, Congress also appropriated \$120 million in FY 2019 annual funding to the EFSP. The funding, totaling \$320 million, will be distributed beginning in early June 2020 to human service organizations assisting those in need throughout the country.

The National Board is chaired by FEMA with representatives from American Red Cross, Catholic Charities USA, The Jewish Federations of North America, National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA, The Salvation Army, and United Way Worldwide. The National Board administers the program, establishing its policies, procedures, and guidelines. United Way Worldwide, selected by the National Board to serve as its Secretariat and Fiscal Agent, carries out the work of the EFSP daily.

EFSP funding is allocated to qualifying local jurisdictions (counties and cities) based on a formula using the most recent national population, unemployment, and poverty data. Each funded jurisdiction establishes a Local Board that awards the grant funds to local social service organizations, both nonprofit and governmental, that can best address the identified needs of the community. With the FY 2019 and CARES Act funding, and the FY 2020 funding of \$125 million that is to be allocated to jurisdictions a couple months later, the total aid disbursed in the EFSP's 38-year history will be more than \$5 billion.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Pandemic: Whole-of-America Response

Attached you will find today's FEMA Daily Briefing Points for the Whole-of-America response to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. These briefing points include Topline Messages, as well as information on Supply Chain Task Force; By the Numbers; FEMA and Department of Health and Human Services Response; and Guidance from Federal Agencies.

Topline messaging includes:

- As of May 5, FEMA, HHS, and the private sector combined have coordinated the delivery of or are currently shipping: 86.1 million N95 respirators, 123.5 million surgical masks, 8.2 million face shields, 19.4 million surgical gowns, 948.6 million gloves, 10,663 ventilators and 8,450 federal medical station beds.
 - FEMA is coordinating two shipments totaling a 14-day supply of personal protective equipment to all 15,400 Medicaid and Medicare-certified nursing homes. The shipments are meant to supplement existing efforts to provide equipment to nursing homes.
- As of May 5, CDC, state, and local public health labs and other laboratories have tested more than 7.4 million samples.
 - HHS and FEMA have expanded items supplied by the <u>International Reagent</u>
 <u>Resource (IRR)</u> to help public health labs access free diagnostics supplies and reagents.
 - As of May 4, the FDA has issued 60 individual <u>emergency use authorizations</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories.
- While FEMA continues to lead the federal operations to the whole-of-America response
 to the pandemic, the agency continues to prepare for and respond to other disasters
 that may occur during this time.
 - This week is Hurricane Preparedness Week and there has been great interest in how FEMA is preparing to lead response and recovery efforts for additional

disasters, such as hurricanes, during the COVID-19 environment.

- FEMA has already responded to severe weather during this pandemic, with devastating tornadoes in the southeast, while the agency also prepares for the start of the 2020 hurricane season in just less than a month.
- FEMA continues to take deliberate and proactive steps to safeguard our ability to respond and recover from future disaster that may arise during this pandemic.
- On April 27, President Trump unveiled the <u>Opening Up America Again Testing Overview</u> and <u>Testing Blueprint</u> designed to facilitate state development and implementation of the robust testing plans and rapid response programs described in the President's <u>Guidelines for Opening Up America Again</u>.
 - The President's Testing Blueprint sets forth the partnership between federal, state, local, and tribal governments, along with the private-sector and professional associations, all of which play important roles in meeting the Nation's testing needs.
- To support the Administration's <u>Testing Blueprint</u>, FEMA is working to source and procure testing material – specifically, testing swabs and transport media.

 - As of May 4, the FDA has issued 60 individual <u>emergency use authorizations</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories.
- While FEMA continues to lead the federal operations to the whole-of-America response
 to the pandemic, the agency continues to prepare for and respond to other disasters
 that may occur during this time.
 - This week is Hurricane Preparedness Week and there has been great interest in how FEMA is preparing to lead response and recovery efforts for additional

disasters, such as hurricanes, during the COVID-19 environment.

- FEMA has already responded to severe weather during this pandemic, with devastating tornadoes in the southeast, while the agency also prepares for the start of the 2020 hurricane season in just less than a month.
- FEMA continues to take deliberate and proactive steps to safeguard our ability to respond and recover from future disaster that may arise during this pandemic.
- On April 27, President Trump unveiled the <u>Opening Up America Again Testing Overview</u> and <u>Testing Blueprint</u> designed to facilitate state development and implementation of the robust testing plans and rapid response programs described in the President's <u>Guidelines for Opening Up America Again</u>.
 - The President's Testing Blueprint sets forth the partnership between federal, state, local, and tribal governments, along with the private-sector and professional associations, all of which play important roles in meeting the Nation's testing needs.
- To support the Administration's <u>Testing Blueprint</u>, FEMA is working to source and procure testing material specifically, testing swabs and transport media.
 - The FEMA-sourced material will be provided to states, territories and tribes for a limited duration to help increase testing capacity in support of their individualized plans.

FEMA Implementation of Allocation Order on

Exports of Scarce PPE and Notice of Exemptions

FEMA recently published a Temporary Final Rule and a subsequent notice in the Federal Register to support President Trump's "Memorandum on Allocating Certain Scarce or Threatened Health and Medical Resources to Domestic Use" issued on April 3, 2020.

The COVID-19 National Strategy for Addressing Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Shortage seeks to ensure protection against COVID-19 for healthcare workers, first responders, and patients by implementing three pillars of practice: reduce, reuse and repurpose. Industries that use similar PPE (e.g., N95 respirators) as part of their normal duties will be challenged in obtaining PPE while available supply is prioritized for healthcare workers and first responders. Industries whose essential critical infrastructure workers need PPE to perform their duties should continue working with suppliers to acquire needed PPE, but should expect shortages to continue. All industries should immediately implement strategies to preserve existing supplies of PPE and find alternative work methods to address shortfalls. A critical component in implementing PPE preservation strategies is determining the appropriate level of PPE for use. Non-healthcare industries should carefully consider whether PPE is required by law or regulation as part of their routine duties, or whether it is needed for mitigating employee exposure to COVID-19.

The intent of the President's Memorandum and the FEMA Administrator's allocation order are to preserve scarce personal protective equipment for domestic use in the response to the COVID-19 emergency. FEMA is working closely with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to implement the allocation order through the <u>Temporary Final Rule</u> published on April 10. The notice lists the Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) subject to this allocation order to include: N95 respirators, and a variety of other filtering respirators; air-purifying respirators; surgical masks; and, surgical gloves.

On April 21, FEMA published a "Notification of Exemptions" in the Federal Register to supplement the rule. Every exporter is required to submit data about their shipment into the Automated Export System (AES) to electronically declare their international exports. When reviewing this data, CBP will determine if products are covered under the allocation order or exempt from being held. If no exemptions apply, CBP will notify FEMA for a determination on the shipment.

FEMA will then determine if a shipment is in the national defense interest to remain in the United States as related to the COVID-19 pandemic response. If this is the case, FEMA may purchase part or all of the shipment using a rated order under Title 1, return part or all of the shipment for domestic distribution, or allow part or all of the shipment to be exported. If a shipment is detained, FEMA and CBP will provide a response to the owner of the shipment within 72 hours.


State, Local, and Tribal Leaders -

Thank you to everyone that joined the White House COVID-19 National Briefing Call with State, Local, and Tribal Leaders on April 22. As of April 24, the White House has coordinated 196 COVID-19 briefings that have helped inform over 95,000 State, Local, and Tribal leaders. And we look forward to continuing the partnership and robust coordination and outreach with you. Below, please find a recap of the briefing call. We would also like to highlight several important announcements:

- President Trump Signs H.R. 266 Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act: Friday, April 24, President Trump signed the new legislation into law to further assist American businesses, workers and healthcare providers. The legislation provides \$310 billion in additional funding for the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), \$60 billion more for the Small Business Administration's (SBA) Disaster Loan Program, \$75 billion in funding for hospitals and healthcare providers, and \$25 billion to support our Nation's testing efforts. - President Trump Announces Comprehensive Strategy to Revitalize Communities Hit Hard by the Coronavirus: Wednesday, April 22, President Trump announced that the Administration is implementing a comprehensive strategy for distressed communities severely impacted by the coronavirus. Working with State and local leaders, the Administration will target resources to these communities and take other measures, including providing more support for community health care centers and expanding access to telehealth. The effort will be directed by the White House Opportunity and Revitalization Council led by House and Urban Development Secretary Ben Carson.
- U.S. Department of the Treasury Releases Coronavirus Relief Fund Guidance: Wednesday, April 22, the U.S. Department of the Treasury released guidance for State, Local, and Tribal Governments regarding the Coronavirus Relief Fund of the CARES Act. As stated by the legislation signed by President Trump on March 27, the use of funds "are necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID–19)." As of April 17, the IRS issued 88.1 million payments to taxpayers across the nation. More payments are continuing to be delivered each week. More than 150 million payments will be sent out, and millions of people who do not typically file a tax return are eligible to receive these payments. Payments are automatic for people who filed a tax return in 2018 or 2019, receive Social Security retirement, survivor or disability benefits (SSDI), Railroad Retirement benefits, as well as Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Veterans Affairs beneficiaries who didn't file a tax return in the last two years. 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
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- Treasury Department and IRS Release State-by-State Figures for Economic Impact Payments: The Treasury Department and the Internal Revenue Service today released state-by-state figures for Economic Impact

Payments, with 88 million individuals receiving payments worth nearly \$158 billion in the program's first three weeks. As of April 17, the IRS issued 88.1 million payments to taxpayers across the nation. More payments are continuing to be delivered each week. More than 150 million payments will be sent out, and millions of people who do not typically file a tax return are eligible to receive these payments. Payments are automatic for people who filed a tax return in 2018 or 2019, receive Social Security retirement, survivor or disability benefits (SSDI), Railroad Retirement benefits, as well as Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Veterans Affairs beneficiaries who didn't file a tax return in the last two years. - HHS Award Nearly \$165 Million to Combat the COVID-19 Pandemic in Rural Communities: Wednesday, April 22, the Department of Health and human Services awarded nearly \$165 million to combat the COVID-19 pandemic in rural communities. 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
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

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

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Update: Daily Roundup

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration Friday announced the following actions taken in its ongoing response effort to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- The FDA issued an immediately in effect guidance, <u>Enforcement Policy for Remote Digital Pathology Devices During the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Public Health Emergency</u>, to help expand the availability of devices for remote reviewing and reporting of scanned digital images of pathology slides during this public health emergency. Increased availability of these devices may help to facilitate continuity of patient care by preventing disruptions to critical pathology services rendered by clinical laboratories, hospitals, and other healthcare facilities, and reduce healthcare personnel contact and risk of exposure to SARS-CoV-2.
- The FDA <u>issued</u> a <u>Drug Safety Communication</u> regarding known side effects of hydroxychloroquine and chloroquine, including serious and potentially life-threatening heart rhythm problems, that have been reported with their use for the treatment or prevention of COVID-19, for which they are not approved by the FDA. These risks, which are in the drug labels for their approved uses, may be mitigated when health care professionals closely screen and supervise these patients such as in a hospital setting or a clinical trial, as indicated in the <u>Emergency Use Authorization (EUA)</u> for these drugs to treat COVID-19.
- The FDA and Federal Trade Commission issued a warning letter to a seller of fraudulent COVID-19 products, as part of the agency's effort to protect consumers. The seller warned, Prefense LLC, offers unapproved and misbranded hand sanitizer products for sale in the U.S. with misleading claims that the products are safe and/or effective for the prevention and treatment of COVID-19. There are currently no FDA-approved products to prevent or treat COVID-19. Consumers concerned about COVID-19 should consult with their health care provider.
- Diagnostics update to date:
 - During the COVID-19 pandemic, the FDA has worked with more than 380 test developers who have said they will be submitting emergency use authorizations (EUA) requests to FDA for tests that detect the virus.
 - To date, the FDA has issued 44 individual <u>emergency use authorizations</u> for test kit manufacturers and laboratories. In addition, 19 authorized tests have been added to the EUA letter of authorization for high complexity molecular-based laboratory developed tests (LDTs).
 - The FDA has been notified that more than 225 laboratories have begun testing under

the policies set forth in our COVID-19 Policy for Diagnostic Tests for Coronavirus Disease-2019 during the Public Health Emergency Guidance.

• The FDA also continues to keep its <u>COVID-19 Diagnostics FAQ</u> up to date.



President Donald J. Trump Approves South Carolina Disaster Declaration

Today, President Donald J. Trump declared that a major disaster exists in the State of South Carolina and ordered Federal aid to supplement State, tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, tornadoes, and straight-line winds from April 12 to April 13, 2020.

The President's action makes Federal funding available to affected individuals in the counties of Aiken, Colleton, Hampton, Marlboro, Oconee, Orangeburg, and Pickens.

This assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

Federal funding also is available to State and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by the severe storms, tornadoes, and straight-line winds in the counties of Barnwell, Colleton, Georgetown, Hampton, Oconee, Orangeburg, and Pickens.

Finally, Federal funding is available on a cost-sharing basis for hazard mitigation measures statewide.

Pete Gaynor, Administrator, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Department of Homeland Security, named Allan Jarvis as the Federal Coordinating Officer for Federal recovery operations in the affected areas.

Damage assessments are continuing in other areas, and more counties may be designated after the assessments are fully completed.

Residents and business owners who sustained losses in the designated counties can begin applying for assistance tomorrow by registering online at http://www.DisasterAssistance.gov or by calling 1-800-621-FEMA(3362) or 1-800-462-7585 (TTY) for the hearing and speech impaired. The toll-free telephone numbers will operate from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. (local time) seven days a week until further notice.

HHS Awards More than Half Billion Dollars Across the Nation to Expand COVID-19 Testing

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Today's funding for health centers is part of the Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act, signed into law by President Trump on April 24th. The legislation provides funding for small businesses and individuals financially affected by COVID-19, additional funding for hospitals and healthcare providers, and increased testing capabilities to help track the spread and impact of the coronavirus.

"This new funding secured by President Trump will expand the work health centers are doing to test Americans for COVID-19," said HHS Secretary Alex Azar. "Widespread testing is a critical step in reopening America, and health centers are vital to making testing easily accessible, especially for underserved and minority populations. Further, because health centers can help notify contacts of patients who test positive, they will continue playing an important role in cooperating with state and local public health departments."

HRSA-funded health centers will use this funding to expand the range of testing and testing-related activities to best address the needs of their local communities, including the purchase of personal

protective equipment; training for staff, outreach, procurement and administration of tests; laboratory services; notifying identified contacts of infected health center patients of their exposure to COVID-19; and the expansion of walk-up or drive-up testing capabilities.

"Health centers are a first line of defense, as they are testing for coronavirus and delivering highquality primary care to our nation's most vulnerable populations." said HRSA Administrator Tom Engels. "In the fight against COVID-19, we must marshal all of our resources to keep Americans healthy and care for those who become ill."

Today's investments build upon the \$1.42 billion HRSA has awarded to health centers to address COVID-19, which will bring the Trump Administration's total COVID-19 investment in health centers to nearly \$2 billion.

HHS Begins Distribution of Payments to Hospitals with High COVID-19 Admissions, Rural Providers Today, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is processing payments from the Provider Relief Fund to hospitals with large numbers of COVID-19 inpatient admissions through April 10, 2020, and to rural providers in support of the national response to COVID-19.

"These new payments are being distributed to healthcare providers who have been hardest hit by the virus: \$12 billion to facilities admitting large numbers of COVID-19 patients and \$10 billion to providers in rural areas, who are already working on narrow margins," said **HHS Secretary** Alex Azar. "HHS has put these funds out as quickly as possible, after gathering data to ensure that they are going to the providers who need them the most. With another \$75 billion recently appropriated by Congress, the Trump Administration will continue doing everything we can to support America's heroic healthcare providers on the frontlines of this war

on the virus."

COVID-19 High- Impact Distribution:

Recognizing the particular impact the COVID-19 pandemic has had on hospitals in certain parts of the nation, and that inpatient admissions are a primary driver of costs to hospitals related to COVID-19, HHS is distributing \$12 billion to 395 hospitals who provided inpatient care for 100 or more COVID-19 patients through April 10, 2020, \$2 billion of which will be distributed to these hospitals based on their Medicare and Medicaid disproportionate share and uncompensated care payments.

These 395 hospitals accounted for 71 percent of COVID-19 inpatient admissions reported to HHS from nearly 6,000 hospitals around the country. The distribution uses a simple formula to determine what each hospital receives: hospitals are paid a fixed amount per COVID-19 inpatient admission, with an additional amount taking into account their Medicare and Medicaid disproportionate share and uncompensated care payments.

These hospitals will begin receiving funds via direct deposit in the coming days.

View the state and county breakdown.

Rural Distribution:

Rural hospitals, many of whom were operating on thin margins prior to COVID-19, have also been particularly devastated by this pandemic. As healthy patients delay care and cancel elective services, rural hospitals are struggling to keep their doors open.

Recipients of the \$10 billion rural distribution will include, rural acute care general hospitals and Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs), Rural Health Clinics (RHCs), and Community Health Centers located in rural areas.

Hospitals and RHCs will each receive a minimum base payment plus a percent of their annual expenses. This expense-based method accounts for operating cost and lost revenue incurred by rural hospitals for both inpatient and outpatient services.

The base payment will account for RHCs with no reported Medicare claims, such as pediatric RHCs, and CHCs lacking expense data, by ensuring that all clinical, non-hospital sites receive a minimum level of support no less than \$100,000, with additional payment based on operating expenses. Rural acute care general hospitals and CAHs will receive a minimum level of support of no less than \$1,000,000, with additional payment based on operating expenses.

Eligible providers will begin receiving funds in the coming days via direct deposit, based on the physical address of the facilities as reported to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), regardless of their affiliation with organizations based in urban areas.

HHS and the Administration are continuing to work rapidly on additional targeted distributions to some providers including skilled nursing facilities, dentists, and providers that solely take Medicaid.

More Info on \$20 Billion Coming to Providers for Relief Today: As announced <u>yesterday</u>, another tranche of the Provider Relief Fund is going out the door today. Some of you have had additional questions about the second payment of the General Distribution portion of the PRF, so attached is a fact sheet with additional information, including how a provider might estimate their payment.

More Provider and Testing Funding Coming: Trump signed the \$484 billion Paycheck Protection Program and Health Care Enhancement Act. <u>HHS will receive a total of \$100 billion</u>, with \$75 billion dedicated to hospitals and \$25 billion focused on testing efforts.

How Providers Get Reimbursed for Caring for the Uninsured: On Monday, HRSA will launch a new COVID-19 Uninsured Program Portal (<u>coviduninsuredclaim.linkhealth.com</u>), allowing health care providers who have conducted COVID-19 testing or provided treatment for uninsured COVID-19 patients on or after February 4, 2020 to request claims reimbursement.

<u>Public Health Emergency</u> **Designation Extended**: It was previously set to expire on April 26, but has been renewed by Secretary Azar for an additional 90 days.

Other highlights:

Funding and Resources

Updated HHS Coronavirus Website: HHS has revamped hhs.gov/coronavirus to include more information about mental health resources, telehealth, the Provider Relief Fund, as well as to highlight the work our operating divisions are doing.

\$45 Million in Funding to Support Child Welfare Services: ACF released an <u>additional \$45 million</u> to support the child welfare needs of families during this crisis and to help keep families together. These funds will be dispersed to states, territories, and tribes in an effort to provide financial and administrative support to their child welfare system.

Funding to the Indian Health System: The Indian Health Service allocated the final \$367 million of the \$1.032 billion provided to the agency in the CARES Act funding across the Indian Health system to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic. Additional details of the funding allocation, as well as feedback received from tribal and urban Indian organization leaders, can be found in a letter to tribal and urban Indian organization leaders.

Testing and Treatment:

FDA Cautions Against Use of Antimalarial Drugs to Treat COVID-19: The FDA issued a <u>Drug Safety Communication</u> that cautions against the use of hydroxychloroquine or chloroquine for COVID-19 outside of the hospital setting or a clinical trial due to risk of heart rhythm problems. Problems have been reported with the use of these drugs for the treatment or prevention of COVID-19, for which they are not approved by the FDA. These risks, which are in the drug labels for their approved uses, may be mitigated when health care professionals closely screen and supervise these patients such as in a hospital setting or a clinical trial, as indicated in the Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) for these drugs to treat COVID-19.

Guidance on Thermometers: FDA released information on <u>non-contact infrared thermometers</u>. One method to measure a person's surface temperature is with the use of non-contact infrared thermometers (NCITs). NCITs may be used to reduce cross-contamination risk and minimize the risk of spreading disease. Before NCITs are used, it is important to understand the benefits, limitations, and proper use of these thermometers. Improper use of NCITs may lead to inaccurate measurements of temperature.

Expanding Fetal and Maternal Monitoring Device Availability: FDA issued guidance on non-invasive fetal and maternal monitoring devices to help increase the availability and capability of these devices used to support patient monitoring during the COVID-19 pandemic. These prescription devices include fetal dopplers that lay users (such as patients or caregivers) could be instructed to use in a home setting under the direction of a health care provider as well as other fetal and maternal monitoring devices that could be used by a health care provider in a home setting. Increasing the availability of these devices may increase access to important prenatal data without the need for inclinic visits and facilitate patient management by health care providers while reducing the need for in-office or in-hospital services during the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Expanding Availability of Imaging Systems: The FDA issued a <u>guidance</u> to help increase availability and capability of imaging systems needed for diagnosis and treatment monitoring of lung disease in patients during the COVID-19 pandemic. These imaging products include medical x-ray, ultrasound, magnetic resonance imaging systems, and image analysis software that are used to diagnose and monitor medical conditions. Increasing the availability of mobile and portable imaging systems may increase options to image patients inside and outside of healthcare facilities, which could help to reduce the spread of COVID-19.

Expanding Remote Digital Images Availability: FDA <u>issued guidance</u> to provide a policy to help expand the availability of devices for remote reviewing and reporting of scanned digital images of pathology slides ("digital pathology slides") (hereinafter these devices will be referred to as "remote digital pathology devices") during this pandemic.

Encouraging Signs in CDC's Weekly COVID Summary: CDC released their COVIDView Weekly Summary. The key points from this week include: (1) the percentage of laboratory specimens testing positive for SARS-CoV-2 remained similar to, or decreased, compared to last week; (2) visits to outpatient providers and emergency departments (EDs) for illnesses with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 continued to decline and are below baseline in many areas of the country.

PPE and Supplies

Preserving Medical Supplies: FEMA recently published a <u>Temporary Final Rule and allocation order</u> to preserve scarce personal protective equipment for domestic use in the response to the COVID-19 emergency. FEMA is working closely with U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to implement the allocation order on exports through the Temporary Final Rule published on April 10. The Personal Protective Equipment subject to this allocation order includes: N95 respirators, and a variety of other filtering respirators; air-purifying respirators; surgical masks; and, surgical gloves.

Guidance for Specific Populations

Information on Medicare Fee-for-Service Billing: CMS released an updated <u>FAQ document on Medicare fee-for-service billing</u>. The FAQs cover topics including payment for specimen collection, diagnostic laboratory services, hospital services, ambulance services, FQHCs and RHCs, telehealth, physician services, home infusion services, accountable care organizations, cost reporting, opioid treatment programs, inpatient rehab, skilled nursing, home health and more.

Mental Health Resources: HHS released a new webpage on mental health and coping during the pandemic. Everyone reacts differently to stressful situations such as an infectious disease outbreak. It is normal to experience a wide range of emotions. This page has information about resources and advice to help you cope and to support your mental and behavioral health during the COVID-19 pandemic. Many of these resources are available in multiple languages.

SBA Says Municipally-Owned Rural Hospitals Are Eligible for Loans: Not HHS, but important to healthcare providers, today the Small Business Administration <u>clarified that public hospitals</u> are eligible for the Paycheck Protection Program loans. According to reports, about a third of rural hospitals are municipal-owned entities that usually are blocked from receiving federal small business loans. Now, this financial lifeline is open to them.

Last evening at the COVID-19 press briefing, President Trump unveiled the <u>Opening Up America</u> <u>Again Testing Overview</u> and <u>Testing Blueprint</u> designed to facilitate state development and implementation of the robust testing plans and rapid response programs described in the President's <u>Guidelines for Opening Up America Again</u>.

The President's Testing Blueprint sets forth the partnership between federal, state, local, and tribal governments, along with the private-sector and professional associations, all of which will play important roles in meeting the Nation's testing needs. The federal government provides strategic guidance on the best use of available technologies, approves new tests to expand capacity, shares best practices with states, and more. As different localities have different needs, states should each develop testing plans and rapid response programs that fit the needs of their communities.

As we move to the next phase of the pandemic, the Administration recognizes the importance of testing. Secretary Azar published an op-ed in USA Today on testing and contact tracing. He notes that CDC is deploying field teams tailored to the needs of states, as requested, to assist with contact tracing plans and advise on tools like digital technology and serologic testing. Health departments will need thousands of new workers or contractors to do the legwork of contact tracing and the CARES Act has an additional \$11 billion for states to bolster their testing capacity.

These extensions provide participants and beneficiaries of employee benefit plans additional time to make important health coverage and other decisions affecting their benefits during the coronavirus outbreak.

Today the Administration made numerous announcements focused on protecting Older Americans – a population we know is particularly vulnerable to COVID-19.

This afternoon, the President, Secretary Azar, and other senior Administration officials hosted a call with organizations representing seniors. As part of the designation of May as Older Americans Month, the White House announced actions taken and new initiatives to keep America's seniors safe, including actions related to expansions of telehealth, nursing home reporting, and protecting seniors from fraud and abuse. The Administration will also be establishing the Coronavirus Commission for Safety and Quality in Nursing Homes. Read below for more details on the flexibilities and new actions the Department is taking to ensure that the nation's senior citizens are protected.

PPE to Nursing Homes: The Trump Administration announced today that <u>shipments of PPE</u> will be sent to 15,400 Medicaid and Medicare-certified nursing homes across the country. Worker and patient protection in these settings is critical.

New CMS Flexibilities for Telehealth, Increasing Hospital and Workforce Capacity and Decreasing Administrative Burdens: CMS announced another round of sweeping regulatory waivers and rule changes to deliver expanded care to the nation's seniors and provide flexibility to the healthcare system as America reopens. These waivers and rule changes include making it easier for Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries to get tested for COVID-19 as well as provisions to increase hospital capacity, augment the healthcare workforce, decrease administrative burden, and further expand telehealth in Medicare. Specifically, telehealth services can now be provided by an expanded set of providers (including physical, occupational and speech therapists) and audio-only visits can be used for certain visits and are included in the list of Medicare telehealth services. CMS is also requiring nursing homes to inform residents, their families, and representatives about COVID-19 outbreaks in their facilities. CMS is also providing states with \$81 million from the CARES Act to increase their inspections of nursing homes.

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National Healthcare Safety Network, which provides healthcare facilities, such as long-term care facilities, with a customized system to track infections and prevention process measures in a systematic way. The NHSH introduced a <u>new COVID-19 Module for long-term care facilities</u> such as nursing homes/skilled nursing, long-term care for the developmentally disabled, and assisted living facilities to track and report on resident impact and facility capacity, staff and personnel impact, supplies and PPE, and ventilator capacity and supplies.

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Flexibility on the Drug Supply Chain: FDA issued a guidance highlighting flexibility under the Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA) for trading partners responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency. The guidance states that during the COVID-19 public health emergency, DSCSA requirements related to certain product tracing and product identification activities, and wholesale distribution, do not apply to the emergency distribution of prescription drugs issued an emergency use authorization to combat COVID-19 or approved by FDA to diagnose, cure, mitigate, treat or prevent COVID-19. This legal flexibility regarding certain DSCSA requirements for such emergency medical reasons strikes a balance between the need for effective distribution of products in certain circumstances and protecting consumers from harmful products.

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The \$22 billion funding represents the next tranches of disbursement from the Provider Relief Fund, authorized by the CARES Act.

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- Any hospital who reported serving 100 or more COVID-19 patients through the portal HHS set up in April is receiving funding.
- The distribution was based on a simple formula: hospitals are paid a fixed amount per COVID-19 inpatient admission, with an adjustment added on top.
- The adjustment on top a total of \$2 billion is added to the hospitals located in hot spot areas and based on their Medicare and Medicaid disproportionate share and uncompensated care payments. This \$2 billion plus-up is to provide the extra funding needed by these frontline hospitals who have little-to-no reserve to scale up for handling heavy COVID-19 patient caseloads.
- Based on these calculations, a total of 395 hospitals will be receiving the funding.
- Those 395 hospitals represent 71% of COVID-19 Admissions.
- In total, the hotspot funding will be going to 33 states.
- Hospitals will begin receiving funds via direct deposit in the coming days.

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- We recognize that rural hospitals and other rural providers operate on thin margins even during "normal" times, but with the advent of COVID-19, they are particularly hard hit.
- Therefore, under this targeted provider relief, four kinds of rural healthcare providers will receive dollars:
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- Community Health Centers located in rural areas.
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- The base payment will account for RHCs with no reported Medicare claims, such as pediatric RHCs, and CHCs lacking expense data, by ensuring that all clinical, non-hospital sites receive a minimum level of support no less than \$100,000, with additional payment based on operating expenses.
- Rural acute care general hospitals and CAHs will receive a minimum level of support of no less than \$1,000,000, with additional payment based on operating expenses.
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Astute observers can add correctly and know that the \$50 billion in general distribution already released, plus today's \$22 billion in targeted provider relief, plus funding for the uninsured announced earlier still will not fully use all \$100 billion passed in the CARES Act. On that score, HHS is continuing to work on distribution for additional provider relief needs, and, of course, recognizes that Congress has recently added \$75 billion in additional funding to support our critical healthcare system.

Large-scale, rapid genomic sequencing of the virus that causes COVID-19 will allow public health experts to: monitor important changes in the virus as it continues to circulate; gain important insights to support contact tracing; provide crucial information to aid in identifying diagnostic and therapeutic targets; and advance public health research in the areas of transmission dynamics, host response, and evolution of the virus.

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PPE and Supplies

PPE in the Context of Global Supply Shortages: CDC released a document on Operational Considerations for Personal Protective Equipment in the Context of Global Supply Shortages for Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Pandemic: non-US Healthcare Settings. This document provides specific operational considerations that healthcare settings and healthcare authorities can review in the context of global supply shortages of personal protective equipment (PPE), to help with decision making in order to provide needed surge capacity during the COVID-19 response. High-level and continued efforts will be needed to maintain and scale-up the PPE supply chain to ensure availability of PPE in healthcare settings where it is needed, to avoid supply shortages, and allow adherence to infection prevention and control standard practice.

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Waiver Flexibilities Update: CMS has approved 140 requests for state relief in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, including recent approvals for Arkansas, Hawaii, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Montana, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Tennessee, Virginia, and Wyoming. These approvals help to ensure that states have the tools they need to combat COVID-19 through a wide variety of waivers, amendments, and Medicaid state plan flexibilities, including for programs that care for the elderly and people with disabilities. CMS developed a <u>toolkit</u> to expedite the application and review of each request and has approved these requests in record time.

Telehealth and HHS-Operated Risk Adjustment for Individual and Small Group Plans: In response to the increased need for providing telehealth due to COVID-19, CMS has given additional consideration to <u>telehealth services in HHS-operated risk adjustment</u> for issuers in the individual and small group health insurance markets inside and outside the Marketplaces. CMS' new guidance clarifies which telehealth services are valid for HHS-operated risk adjustment data submission in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.

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Factors Affecting the Public Health Response to COVID-19: CDC released a report on the <u>Public Health Response</u> to the Initiation and Spread of Pandemic COVID-19 — United States, February 24-April 21, 2020. The findings include recognition of factors associated with amplified spread during the early acceleration period will help inform future decision as locations in the United States scale back some components of mitigation and strengthen systems to detect a transmission resurgence. Because SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, remains in circulation and a large proportion of the population remains susceptible, a potential for future acceleration remains.

Findings from Meat and Poultry Processing Facilities: CDC released a report on COVID-19 in Meat and Poultry Processing Facilities — Selected States, April 2020. During April 9–27, 2020, aggregate data on COVID-19 outbreaks in meat or poultry processing facilities in 19 states were reported to CDC. Among 129,910 workers in affected facilities in these states, COVID-19 had been diagnosed in 4,913 (3.8%) workers and 18 COVID-19-related deaths were reported. Barriers to effective prevention and control of COVID-19 included difficulty distancing workers from one another (both on facility floors and in other areas of facility operations) and in implementing COVID-19-specific disinfection guidelines.

Characteristics and Clinical Outcomes of Hospitalized COVID-19 Patients: CDC published a report on Characteristics and Clinical Outcomes of Adult Patients Hospitalized with COVID-19 — Georgia, March 2020. The report found that in a cohort of 305 hospitalized adults with COVID-19 in Georgia (primarily metropolitan Atlanta), black patients were overrepresented, and their clinical outcomes were similar to those of nonblack patients. 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Findings from Meat and Poultry Processing Facilities: CDC released a report on COVID-19 in Meat and Poultry Processing Facilities — Selected States, April 2020. During April 9–27, 2020, aggregate data on COVID-19 outbreaks in meat or poultry processing facilities in 19 states were reported to CDC. Among 129,910 workers in affected facilities in these states, COVID-19 had been diagnosed in 4,913 (3.8%) workers and 18 COVID-19-related deaths were reported. Barriers to effective prevention and control of COVID-19 included difficulty distancing workers from one another (both on facility floors and in other areas of facility operations) and in implementing COVID-19-specific disinfection guidelines.

Characteristics and Clinical Outcomes of Hospitalized COVID-19 Patients: CDC published a report on Characteristics and Clinical Outcomes of Adult Patients Hospitalized with COVID-19 — Georgia, March 2020. The report found that in a cohort of 305 hospitalized adults with COVID-19 in Georgia (primarily metropolitan Atlanta), black patients were overrepresented, and their clinical outcomes were similar to those of nonblack patients. One in four hospitalized patients had no recognized risk factors for severe COVID-19. The implications of these findings include: prevention activities should prioritize communities and racial groups most affected by severe COVID-19 and increased awareness of the risk for serious illness among all adults, regardless of underlying medical conditions or age, is needed.

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Updates on Convalescent Plasma: The FDA updated its <u>guidance</u> on convalescent plasma and associated <u>web page</u>. The updated guidance provides clarification for investigators on how to submit investigational applications for COVID-19 convalescent plasma. In addition, the guidance includes updated information regarding potential donors. Previously, the FDA's guidance noted that to qualify, individuals should have complete resolution of symptoms for 28 days or resolution for 14 and a negative diagnostic test. The revised guidance recommends that individuals have complete resolution of symptoms for at least 14 days prior to donation. A negative lab test for COVID-19 disease is not necessary to qualify for donation. The revised guidance also clarifies that FDA does not recommend storing a retention sample from the convalescent plasma donation for single patient emergency INDs.

(FFRDC) sponsored by the National Institutes of Health's (NIH) National Cancer Institute (NCI). The results are among the first to come from a collaborative effort by the FDA, NIH, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority (BARDA) to evaluate certain serological tests. Essential samples and materials used in the evaluation were provided by the NIH National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), the Mount Sinai Health System, the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai, including members of the Departments of Microbiology and Pathology, and the Vitalant Research Institute.

CDC Grows the Viral Culture: One important way that CDC has supported global efforts to study and learn about SARS-CoV-2 in the laboratory was by growing the virus in cell culture and ensuring that it was widely available. Researchers in the scientific and medical community can use virus obtained from this work in their studies. SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, was isolated in the laboratory and is available for research by the scientific and medical community. CDC is using the virus to test serum collected from people who have recovered from COVID-19 to look for antibody that might block viral infections; and to determine when people shed live virus during the disease. This information has shaped CDC's guidance on when to discontinue transmission-based precautions for patients.

Optimizing the Supply of PPE: CDC updated their webpage on <u>strategies to optimize the supply of PPE</u>. The webpage includes information on each type of PPE, notes that facilities should be using contingencies strategies at a minimum, and includes guidance on each of the types of PPE.

The Trump Administration continues our work to make sure that states have a range of COVID-19 testing platforms and options. Today, \$583 Million was disbursed to FQHCs for testing. HRSA awarded nearly \$583 million to 1,385 HRSA-funded health centers in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and eight U.S. territories to expand COVID-19 testing. Nearly 88 percent of HRSA-funded health centers report testing patients, with more than 65 percent offering walk-up or drive-up testing. Health centers are currently providing more than 100,000 weekly COVID-19 tests in their local communities. As Secretary Azar noted, these "health centers are vital to making testing easily accessible, especially for underserved and minority populations."

Provider Relief Fund Updates

Attestation Deadline Extended: HHS extended the deadline for healthcare providers to attest to receipt of payments from the Provider Relief Fund and accept the Terms and Conditions. Providers will now have 45 days, increased from 30 days, from the date they receive a payment to attest and accept the Terms and Conditions or return the funds. As an example, the initial 30-day deadline for providers who received payment on April 10, 2020, is extended to May 24 from May 9, 2020. With the extension, not returning the payment within 45 days of receipt of payment will be viewed as acceptance of the Terms and Conditions.

Additional Information for Providers on Uninsured Program: HRSA released <u>FAQs on the Uninsured Program</u> for providers. The FAQs clarify questions related to eligibility for patients and providers, eligible claims and coding, program administration, and reimbursement/payment.

Funding Released for High Impact Distribution: UnitedHealthGroup began disbursing the \$12 billion in funding announced last week to hospitals in high impact areas. Hospitals will receive this funding via direct deposit and will need to review the <u>terms and conditions</u> and sign the <u>attestation form</u> regarding the funding.

Testing Updates

Information on Community-based Testing Sites: HHS created a new webpage and resource with <u>information on community-based testing sites</u>. HHS has partnered with pharmacy and retail companies to accelerate testing for more Americans in more communities across the country. The webpage includes links for how and where to get a drive-thru test.

COVID-19 Q & A for Consumers: FDA posted a new Q/A for consumers that focuses on remdesivir and different types of COVID-19 tests.

Treatment Updates

Manufacturers to Notify FDA if Device will be Discontinued: The FDA issued an immediately in effect guidance Notifying the Center for Devices and Radiological Health of a Permanent Discontinuance or Interruption in Manufacturing of a Device Under Section 506J of the Federal Food. Drug, and Cosmetic Act During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. This guidance is intended to assist manufacturers in providing FDA timely, informative notifications about changes in the production of certain medical device products that will help the Agency prevent or mitigate shortages of such devices during the COVID-19 public health emergency. On May 11, 2020, the FDA will host a webinar for medical device manufacturers and others interested in learning more about the guidance.

Information on Reporting Animal Drug Shortages: FDA released new guidance on Reporting and Mitigating Animal Drug Shortages during the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. To help animal drug sponsors submit timely and informative notifications, FDA is publishing a guidance for immediate implementation about the importance of these notifications, how sponsors can notify FDA, and the details to provide about the discontinuance or interruption of manufacturing and other factors that may impact availability of animal drug products. The guidance also provides examples of steps FDA's Center for Veterinary Medicine (CVM) may take to prevent or mitigate animal drug shortages, and information sponsors can provide proactively to help avoid shortages.

Update on FDA Actions to Combat Fraud: FDA released a statement regarding <u>Combatting Fraudulent COVID-19 Medical Products</u>. The FDA is provided an update on the agency's efforts to combat the extremely concerning actions by companies and individuals that are exploiting or taking advantage of widespread fear among consumers during the COVID-19 pandemic. In response to scammers on the internet selling unproven medical products, the FDA has taken – and continues to take – a number of steps to find and stop those selling unapproved products that fraudulently claim to mitigate, prevent, treat, diagnose or cure COVID-19.

Diagnostics Update: During the COVID-19 pandemic, the FDA has worked with more than 385 test developers who have said they will be submitting EUA requests to the FDA for tests that detect the virus. To date, the FDA has issued 60 individual EUAs for test kit manufacturers and laboratories. In addition, 25 authorized tests have been added to the EUA letter of authorization for high complexity molecular-based laboratory developed tests (LDTs). The FDA has been notified that more than 240 laboratories have begun testing under the policies set forth in our COVID-19 Policy for Diagnostic Tests for Coronavirus Disease-2019 during the Public Health Emergency Guidance.

Reopening America

Cleaning and Disinfection Guidance: CDC previously released detailed guidance on <u>cleaning and disinfection</u>. They have updated their resources to add new information on <u>Cleaning and Disinfecting: Public Spaces, Workplaces, Businesses, Schools, and Homes.</u> The information includes advice on developing a plan, implementing, maintaining and revising a plan as well as decision trees for making a plan to clean and disinfect different types of surfaces.

Information for Critical Infrastructure Employers: CDC released new guidance on <u>COVID-19 Critical Infrastructure Sector Response Planning</u>. The guidance includes information on creating and updating a response plan and what to do if employees are exposed.

Telehealth Updates: HHS with the Surgeon General released a <u>new video on telehealth</u> that shares basic information with consumers about telehealth including the privacy protections and Medicare allowance of payments for visits. ASPR has also posted a new <u>telehealth tipsheet</u> that outlines what it is, who is using it, ongoing challenges for telehealth and trends to watch post COVID-19.

Senior Nutrition Programs: ACL released a guidance document on the <u>Phased Reopening of Senior Nutrition Programs</u>. The Trump Administration continues our work to make sure that states have a range of COVID-19 testing platforms and options. Today, \$583 Million was disbursed to FQHCs for testing. HRSA awarded nearly \$583 million to 1,385 HRSA-funded health centers in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and eight U.S. territories to expand COVID-19 testing. Nearly 88 percent of HRSA-funded health centers report testing patients, with more than 65 percent offering walk-up or drive-up testing. Health centers are currently providing more than 100,000 weekly COVID-19 tests in their local communities. As Secretary Azar noted, these "health centers are vital to making testing easily accessible, especially for underserved and minority populations."

Provider Relief Fund Updates

Attestation Deadline Extended: HHS extended the deadline for healthcare providers to attest to receipt of payments from the Provider Relief Fund and accept the Terms and Conditions. Providers will now have 45 days, increased from 30 days, from the date they receive a payment to attest and accept the Terms and Conditions or return the funds. As an example, the initial 30-day deadline for providers who received payment on April 10, 2020, is extended to May 24 from May 9, 2020. With the extension, not returning the payment within 45 days of receipt of payment will be viewed as acceptance of the Terms and Conditions.

Additional Information for Providers on Uninsured Program: HRSA released <u>FAQs on the Uninsured Program</u> for providers. The FAQs clarify questions related to eligibility for patients and providers, eligible claims and coding, program administration, and reimbursement/payment.

Funding Released for High Impact Distribution: UnitedHealthGroup began disbursing the \$12 billion in funding announced last week to hospitals in high impact areas. Hospitals will receive this funding via direct deposit and will need to review the <u>terms and conditions</u> and sign the <u>attestation form</u> regarding the funding.

Testing Updates

Information on Community-based Testing Sites: HHS created a new webpage and resource with <u>information on community-based testing sites</u>. HHS has partnered with pharmacy and retail companies to accelerate testing for more Americans in more communities across the country. The webpage includes links for how and where to get a drive-thru test.

COVID-19 Q & A for Consumers: FDA posted a new Q/A for consumers that focuses on remdesivir and different types of COVID-19 tests.

Treatment Updates

Manufacturers to Notify FDA if Device will be Discontinued: The FDA issued an immediately in effect guidance Notifying the Center for Devices and Radiological Health of a Permanent Discontinuance or Interruption in Manufacturing of a Device Under Section 506J of the Federal Food. Drug, and Cosmetic Act During the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. This guidance is intended to assist manufacturers in providing FDA timely, informative notifications about changes in the production of certain medical device products that will help the Agency prevent or mitigate shortages of such devices during the COVID-19 public health emergency. On May 11, 2020, the FDA will host a webinar for medical device manufacturers and others interested in learning more about the guidance.

Information on Reporting Animal Drug Shortages: FDA released new guidance on Reporting and Mitigating Animal Drug Shortages during the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. To help animal drug sponsors submit timely and informative notifications, FDA is publishing a guidance for immediate implementation about the importance of these notifications, how sponsors can notify FDA, and the details to provide about the discontinuance or interruption of manufacturing and other factors that may impact availability of animal drug products. The guidance also provides examples of steps FDA's Center for Veterinary Medicine (CVM) may take to prevent or mitigate animal drug shortages, and information sponsors can provide proactively to help avoid shortages.

Update on FDA Actions to Combat Fraud: FDA released a statement regarding <u>Combatting Fraudulent COVID-19 Medical Products</u>. The FDA is provided an update on the agency's efforts to combat the extremely concerning actions by companies and individuals that are exploiting or taking advantage of widespread fear among consumers during the COVID-19 pandemic. In response to scammers on the internet selling unproven medical products, the FDA has taken – and continues to take – a number of steps to find and stop those selling unapproved products that fraudulently claim to mitigate, prevent, treat, diagnose or cure COVID-19.

Diagnostics Update: During the COVID-19 pandemic, the FDA has worked with more than 385 test developers who have said they will be submitting EUA requests to the FDA for tests that detect the virus. To date, the FDA has issued 60 individual EUAs for test kit manufacturers and laboratories. In addition, 25 authorized tests have been added to the EUA letter of authorization for high complexity molecular-based laboratory developed tests (LDTs). The FDA has been notified that more than 240 laboratories have begun testing under the policies set forth in our COVID-19 Policy for Diagnostic Tests for Coronavirus Disease-2019 during the Public Health Emergency Guidance.

ICYMI | Second Round of SBA's Paycheck Protection Program Processed Nearly \$50 Billion in Loans in First 24 Hours

The second round of the Small Business Administration's (SBA) Payment Protection Program (PPP) processed in 24 hours nearly twice the total dollar amount of loans the administration processes in the average year.

Senior Trump administration officials briefed on the situation gave the Daily Caller the updated statistics Tuesday afternoon. The SBA granted roughly 450,000 loans from 5,100 lenders for a total sum of \$48.5 billion. Typically, the SBA processes roughly \$28 billion in loans per year from anywhere between 1,700-1,800 lenders.

"President Trump is delivering on his promise to provide immediate relief for America's small businesses," one administration official told the Daily Caller. "The president will continue working every day to ensure Americans who are hurting through no fault of their own as a result of the coronavirus have the support they need."

Monday was the first day since April 16 that PPP loans were authorized by SBA following the exhaustion of the first \$350 billion allocated by Congress in Phase 2.

The Phase 3.5 deal reached the previous week by Congress and President Donald Trump's administration blocked off \$60 billion for loans from small and medium sized banks. Officials noted that of the \$48.5 billion in loans approved on Monday, \$28 billion were processed by institutions with less than \$10 billion in total assets.

The figures also suggest that the second round fixed the oversight that allowed companies with sufficient liquidity to survive the current economic uncertainty from taking money from the first round of PPP lending. The average loan processed Monday — predicated off a company's payroll and other monthly expenses — was worth roughly \$110,000, nearly half the size of the first round's average loan.

One official added that despite headlines on companies like Ruth's Chris Steak House and Shake Shack being approved for loans in round one, 74% of all loans were still for less than \$150,000 and that the overwhelming majority went to companies with less than 10 employees.

By extrapolating Monday's data, the aide clarified that the loans are being concentrated even more at the small business level.

The officials also categorized Monday reports of glitches with the PPP application portal as signs of a successful program, explaining that any issues with the site were caused by the massive number of people applying for loans.

Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin previewed on CNBC yet an additional layer of oversight aimed at making sure small businesses benefit from PPP. Moving forward, he explained, all loan applications worth \$2 million and up will be audited by Treasury, and that "it's the borrowers who have criminal liability." His announcement comes after SBA published new PPP guidelines, stating that company executives who are found to violate the "good faith" application process will face up to 30 years in prison and million-dollar fines.

Mnuchin further touted the 100 Certified Development Financial Institutions making PPP loans and hoped to soon "increase that to 400."

"Particularly in communities that have been hardest hit, we make sure they're going to get that money," he explained. "We're going to do what we need to do to make sure everybody is treated fairly in this program."

It should be noted that the PPP data is rolling, and the numbers reviewed by the Daily Caller will soon be out of date.

Joint Statement of USTR Robert Lighthizer and UK Secretary of State for International Trade Elizabeth Truss

Washington, DC – Today, United States Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer and United Kingdom Secretary of State for International Trade Elizabeth Truss announced the formal launch of trade agreement negotiations between the U.S. and the UK.

In light of the ongoing global pandemic caused by Covid-19, the first round of negotiations will be conducted virtually, with U.S. and UK negotiators engaging in discussions over the next two weeks in nearly 30 different negotiating groups covering all aspects of a comprehensive trade agreement.

Both parties agree that a Free Trade Agreement would contribute to the long-term health of our economies, which is vitally important as we recover from the challenges posed by Covid-19. An FTA is a priority for both countries and we share a commitment to secure an ambitious agreement that significantly boosts trade and investment. We will undertake negotiations at an

accelerated pace and have committed the resources necessary to progress at a fast pace.

United States Trade Representative Lighthizer said: "Under the leadership of President Trump, the United States will negotiate an ambitious and high-standard trade agreement with the UK that will strengthen our economies, support good-paying jobs and substantially improve opportunities for trade and investment between our two countries. This will be an historic agreement that is consistent with U.S. priorities and the negotiating objectives established by Congress in U.S. law."

UK Secretary of State for International Trade Elizabeth Truss said: "The US is our largest trading partner and increasing transatlantic trade can help our economies bounce back from the economic challenge posed by Coronavirus. We want to strike an ambitious deal that opens up new opportunities for our businesses, brings in more investment and creates better jobs for people across the whole of the country. As the Prime Minister has said, the UK is a champion of free trade and this deal will make it even easier to do business with our friends across the pond."

The US negotiating team will be led by Dan Mullaney, Assistant U.S. Trade Representative for Europe and the Middle East; and the UK negotiating team will be led by Oliver Griffiths, Director for US Negotiations at the Department for International Trade. Over 200 staff from U.S. and UK government agencies and departments are expected to take part in the negotiations.

An opening plenary today will kick off the detailed discussions, followed by multiple virtual meetings from Wednesday 6 May to Friday 15 May. The negotiations build on the work conducted through the U.S.-UK Trade and Investment Working Group, which was established in July 2017, partly to lay the ground work for these negotiations.

A comprehensive U.S.-UK trade agreement will further deepen the already very strong trade and investment ties between the United States and UK by creating new opportunities for American and UK families, workers, businesses and farmers through increased access to the other's market. The United States and the United Kingdom are the first and fifth largest economies in the world, respectively. Total two-way trade between the two countries is already worth about \$269 billion a year. Each country is the other's largest source of foreign direct investment, with about \$1 trillion invested in each other's economies. Every day, around one million Americans go to work for UK firms, while around one million Britons go to work for American firms.

The U.S.-UK trade agreement will be a modern agreement designed for the highly advanced and sophisticated U.S. and UK economies. Both governments are committed to maintaining high levels of health, safety, and environmental protection that will serve as a model free trade agreement for the world.

USTR notified Congress in October 2018 of the Trump Administration's intent to negotiate a trade agreement with the UK. In February 2019, USTR published the U.S. negotiating objectives for the UK.

<u>Fact Sheet – President Donald J. Trump is Taking Action to Ensure the Safety of Our Nation's Food Supply Chain</u>

"We're working very hard to make sure our food supply chain is sound and plentiful." – President Donald J. Trump

PROTECTING MEAT SUPPLIES: President Donald J. Trump is using the Defense Production Act to ensure that Americans have a reliable supply of products like beef, pork, and poultry.

- President Trump is signing an Executive Order providing the authority to ensure the continued supply of beef, pork, and poultry to the American people.
- Under the order, the Department of Agriculture is directed to ensure America's meat and poultry processors continue operations uninterrupted to the maximum extent possible.
 - To ensure worker safety, these processors will continue to follow the latest guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).
- Unfortunately, a number of America's large meat processors and their workers have been affected by outbreaks of coronavirus (COVID-19).
- In addition, recent actions in some States have led to the complete closure of large processing facilities.

• This action will further ensure that vitally important food processors are able to continue to operate safely and meet the consumer needs of the American people.

SUPPORTING CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE: Closure of meat and poultry processing plants can quickly have an outsized impact on our Nation's food supply chain.

- Given the high concentration of meat and poultry processors in a relatively small number of large facilities, closure of any of these plants could disrupt our food supply and detrimentally impact our hardworking farmers and ranchers.
- Closure of a single large beef processing plant can result in the loss of over 10 million servings of beef in a single day.
- Similarly, the closure of a single plant can eliminate more than 80 percent of the supply of a particular meat product—like ground beef—to an entire grocery store chain.
- Failure to process livestock could force millions of pounds of meat to disappear from the market, potentially leading to long-term disruptions in our supply chain.
- To combat this crisis and ensure the adequate availability of food for the American people, it is vital that these processors are able to remain operating at this critical moment, while also taking steps to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in their facilities.

STOCKING OUR SHELVES: President Trump has taken decisive action to make sure that Americans retain access to a variety of food and goods during the COVID-19 outbreak.

- From the very outset of the domestic COVID-19 outbreak in January, the President has worked to ensure the grocery store shelves remain stocked with food and goods.
- In March, the President held a teleconference with grocery store executives to make sure food and essentials would remain available during the outbreak.
- In April, the President announced that his Administration would provide \$16 billion to farmers, ranchers, and food producers who experience economic losses during this pandemic.
- Through the Department of Agriculture, the Administration is purchasing \$3 billion in fresh produce, dairy, and meat products of excess supply to be distributed in order to assist Americans in need as well as producers with lost markets.

Press Release – USDA To Implement President Trump's Executive Order On Meat and Poultry Processors

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue released the following statement after President Donald J. Trump signed an Executive Order to keep meat and poultry processing facilities open during the COVID-19 national emergency.

"I thank President Trump for signing this executive order and recognizing the importance of keeping our food supply chain safe, secure, and plentiful. Our nation's meat and poultry processing facilities play an integral role in the continuity of our food supply chain," said Secretary Perdue. "Maintaining the health and safety of these heroic employees in order to ensure that these critical facilities can continue operating is paramount. I also want to thank the companies who are doing their best to keep their workforce safe as well as keeping our food supply sustained. USDA will continue to work with its partners across the federal government to ensure employee safety to maintain this essential industry."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) of the Department of Health and Human Services and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) of the Department of Labor have put out guidance for plants to implement to help ensure employee safety to reopen plants or to continue to operate those still open. Under the Executive Order and the authority of the Defense Production Act, USDA will work with meat processing to affirm they will operate in accordance with the CDC and OSHA guidance, and then work with state and local officials to ensure that these plants are allowed to operate to produce the meat protein that Americans need. USDA will continue to work with the CDC, OSHA, FDA, and state and local officials to ensure that facilities implementing this guidance to keep employees safe can continue operating.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

DELEGATING AUTHORITY UNDER THE DEFENSE PRODUCTION ACT WITH RESPECT TO FOOD SUPPLY CHAIN RESOURCES DURING THE NATIONAL EMERGENCY CAUSED BY THE OUTBREAK OF COVID-19

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, including the Defense Production Act of 1950, as amended (50 U.S.C. 4501 *et seq.*) (the "Act"), and section 301 of title 3, United States Code, it is hereby ordered as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. <u>Policy</u>. The 2019 novel (new) coronavirus known as SARS-CoV-2, the virus causing outbreaks of the disease COVID-19, has significantly disrupted the lives of Americans. In Proclamation 9994 of March 13, 2020 (Declaring a National Emergency Concerning the Novel Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19) Outbreak), I declared that the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States constituted a national emergency, beginning March 1, 2020. Since then, the American people have united behind a policy of mitigation strategies, including social distancing, to flatten the

curve of infections and reduce the spread of COVID-19. The COVID-19 outbreak and these necessary mitigation measures have taken a dramatic toll on the United States economy and critical infrastructure.

It is important that processors of beef, pork, and poultry ("meat and poultry") in the food supply chain continue operating and fulfilling orders to ensure a continued supply of protein for Americans. However, outbreaks of COVID-19 among workers at some processing facilities have led to the reduction in some of those facilities' production capacity. In addition, recent actions in some States have led to the complete closure of some large processing facilities. Such actions may differ from or be inconsistent with interim guidance recently issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) of the Department of Health and Human Services and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) of the Department of Labor entitled "Meat and Poultry Processing Workers and Employers" providing for the safe operation of such facilities.

Such closures threaten the continued functioning of the national meat and poultry supply chain, undermining critical infrastructure during the national emergency. Given the high volume of meat and poultry processed by many facilities, any unnecessary closures can quickly have a large effect on the food supply chain. For example, closure of a single large beef processing facility can result in the loss of over 10 million individual servings of beef in a single day. Similarly, under established supply chains, closure of a single meat or poultry processing facility can severely disrupt the supply of protein to an entire grocery store chain.

Accordingly, I find that meat and poultry in the food supply chain meet the criteria specified in section 101(b) of the Act (50 U.S.C. 4511(b)). Under the delegation of authority provided in this order, the Secretary of Agriculture shall take all appropriate action under that section to ensure that meat and poultry processors continue operations consistent with the guidance for their operations jointly issued by the CDC and OSHA. Under the delegation of authority provided in this order, the Secretary of Agriculture may identify additional specific food supply chain resources that meet the criteria of section 101(b).

- Sec. 2. Ensuring the Continued Supply of Meat and Poultry. (a) Notwithstanding Executive Order 13603 of March 16, 2012 (National Defense Resources Preparedness), the authority of the President to require performance of contracts or orders (other than contracts of employment) to promote the national defense over performance of any other contracts or orders, to allocate materials, services, and facilities as deemed necessary or appropriate to promote the national defense, and to implement the Act in subchapter III of chapter 55 of title 50, United States Code (50 U.S.C. 4554, 4555, 4556, 4559, 4560), is delegated to the Secretary of Agriculture with respect to food supply chain resources, including meat and poultry, during the national emergency caused by the outbreak of COVID-19 within the United States.
- (b) Secretary of Agriculture shall use the authority under section 101 of the Act, in consultation with the heads of such other executive departments and agencies as he deems appropriate, to determine the proper nationwide priorities and allocation of all

the materials, services, and facilities necessary to ensure the continued supply of meat and poultry, consistent with the guidance for the operations of meat and poultry processing facilities jointly issued by the CDC and OSHA.

- (c) The Secretary of Agriculture shall issue such orders and adopt and revise appropriate rules and regulations as may be necessary to implement this order.
- <u>Sec. 3. General Provisions.</u> (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:
- (i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or
- (ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.
- (b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations.
- (c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.



For this reason, and as a matter of administrative convenience in light of the emergency nature of this program, a State, territorial, local, or Tribal government may presume that payroll costs for public health and public safety employees are payments for services substantially dedicated to mitigating or responding to the COVID-19 public health emergency, unless the chief executive (or equivalent) of the relevant government determines that specific circumstances indicate otherwise.

- Daily broad healthcare capacity data reporting on key hospital capacity and ventilator use metrics.
- Daily State's stockpile inventory and hospital PPE supplies to assist with our prioritization of supplies and equipment deliveries to areas most in need.

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



Thank you for your efforts in the whole-of-America approach to respond to COVID-19 and plan for America's economic recovery including implementation of robust testing plans. Over the past several governors briefings with the President and Vice President, governors have shared best practices on leading their entire testing ecosystem, including scaling and utilizing all testing capacity, improving transparency on all testing options, expanding testing in nursing homes and prisons, and bolstering contact tracing and surveillance.

Your state health official(s) has received a similar email with this information from the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC). I wanted to ensure you all received this information as well.

On April 20, each governor and staff received state-by-state testing platform information that included a state-specific high and low throughput machine location map and location details. Since then, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), CDC, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and the White House have conducted one-on-one technical assistance calls with states.

U.S. Notifies Full Compliance in WTO Aircraft Dispute

Termination of Washington State Tax Break Eliminates Any Basis for EU tariffs

Washington, DC – The United States notified the World Trade Organization (WTO) today that it has fully complied in the dispute brought by the European Union (EU) regarding U.S. subsidies to Boeing. In April 2019, the WTO found that the Washington State Business & Occupation (B&O) tax rate reduction continued to breach WTO subsidy rules. At that time, the EU was unsuccessful on the remainder of its challenges to 29 state and federal programs alleged to harm Airbus. Washington enacted Senate Bill 6690 on March 25, 2020, which eliminated a preferential tax rate for aerospace manufacturing. The removal of the subsidy fully implements the WTO's recommendation to the United States, bringing an end to this long-running dispute.

"With Washington State's repeal of this relatively minor tax reduction, the United States has fully implemented the WTO's recommendation, ending this dispute," said U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer. "This step ensures that there is no valid basis for the EU to retaliate against any U.S. goods. For more than 15 years, the United States has called on European governments to end their illegal aircraft subsidies. We will continue to press the EU to negotiate a resolution that respects the WTO's findings."

In an ongoing arbitration, the EU is seeking countermeasures of approximately \$10 billion per year. Most of that amount is attributable to the Washington B&O tax rate reduction that

Washington has now repealed. Moreover, a substantial portion is based on aeronautics R&D measures that were not found to violate WTO rules in the compliance proceeding, and therefore, cannot serve as a basis for countermeasures. Accordingly, there is no valid basis for the EU to retaliate against any U.S. goods in this dispute.

Background

After many years of seeking unsuccessfully to convince the EU and four of its member States (France, Germany, Spain, and the United Kingdom) to cease their subsidization of Airbus, in 2004 the United States brought a WTO challenge to EU subsidies. The EU responded by challenging what it claimed were even larger subsidies to Boeing by the United States.

Two separate WTO panels addressed the claims brought by the United States and the EU, respectively. The two processes resulted in two very different sets of WTO findings and subsequent respondent actions.

The U.S. Claims Against the EU

In 2011, the WTO found that the EU provided Airbus \$17 billion in subsidized financing from 1968 to 2006, and that European "launch aid" subsidies breached WTO rules because they were instrumental in permitting Airbus to launch every model of its large civil aircraft, causing Boeing to lose sales of more than 300 aircraft and to lose market share throughout the world. In response, the EU removed two minor subsidies, but left most of them unchanged. The EU also granted Airbus more than \$5 billion in new subsidized "launch aid" financing for its A350 XWB family of aircraft. The United States filed a complaint in March 2012 alleging that the EU not only had failed to comply with the WTO's findings but had further breached WTO rules through

The WTO compliance panel and appellate reports found that EU subsidies to high-value, twinaisle aircraft continued to cause serious prejudice to U.S. interests. The reports found that billions of dollars in launch aid to the A350 XWB cause significant lost sales of Boeing 787 aircraft. The reports also found that subsidies to the A380 continue to cause significant lost sales of Boeing aircraft, as well as impedance of exports of Boeing very large aircraft to the EU, Australia, China, Korea, Singapore, and UAE markets.

In 2018, the United States requested authority to impose countermeasures commensurate with the adverse effects that the EU subsidies continued to cause. The EU challenged the U.S. estimate, and a WTO arbitrator found that the annual adverse effects to the United States amounted to \$7.5 billion per year. The United States imposed countermeasures in October 2019, consistent with the WTO's authorization.

The EU Claims Against the United States

the new subsidized financing for the A350 XWB.

The EU's original 2004 complaint alleged that the United States provided unlawful subsidies to Boeing. In that dispute, the WTO found that the United States provided Boeing with \$3.2-4.3 billion in subsidized research and development funding, certain federal tax benefits, and the Washington State preferential B&O tax, with far more limited market effects than the EU's subsidies to Airbus, which enabled launch of entirely new aircraft programs.

In response to the WTO's findings, the United States modified the research and development funding and revoked much of the tax benefits, which in its view removed any adverse effects to

the EU from Washington B&O tax rate reduction. The EU then filed a compliance challenge in October 2012 alleging that the United States failed to comply with the findings against it. The WTO compliance panel issued a report in June 2017, which rejected 28 of the EU's 29 claims. The appellate report likewise found only that the Washington B&O tax rate reduction continued to cause adverse effects to Airbus. The EU subsequently asked a WTO arbitrator in 2019 to determine the level of countermeasures it could take in response to U.S. non-compliance. The decision in the arbitration is expected later this year.

USMCA To Enter Into Force July 1 After United States Takes Final Procedural Steps For Implementation

Washington, DC – U.S. Trade Representative Robert Lighthizer today notified Congress that Canada and Mexico have taken measures necessary to comply with their commitments under the United States–Mexico–Canada Agreement (USMCA), and that the Agreement will enter into force on July 1, 2020. Following that notification to Congress, the United States became the third country to notify the other Parties that it had completed its domestic procedures to implement the agreement—the final step necessary for the USMCA to enter into force.

The USMCA's entry into force marks the beginning of a historic new chapter for North American trade by supporting more balanced, reciprocal trade, leading to freer markets, fairer trade, and robust economic growth in North America. The Agreement contains significant improvements and modernized approaches to rules of origin, agricultural market access, intellectual property,

digital trade, financial services, labor, and numerous other sectors. These enhancements will deliver more jobs, provide stronger labor protections, and expand market access, creating new opportunities for American workers, farmers, and ranchers.

"The crisis and recovery from the Covid-19 pandemic demonstrates that now, more than ever, the United States should strive to increase manufacturing capacity and investment in North America. The USMCA's entry into force is a landmark achievement in that effort. Under President Trump's leadership, USTR will continue working to ensure a smooth implementation of the USMCA so that American workers and businesses can enjoy the benefits of the new agreement," said Ambassador Robert Lighthizer.

Weekly Update: DHS Response to COVID-19

WASHINGTON –For months, the Department of Homeland Security has undertaken an aggressive and herculean response to minimize the impact of COVID-19 on American citizens and workers. From private industry to local government, every organ of society has been and will continue to be leveraged to protect the American public from irreparable harm. As we begin moving toward reopening the country, the Department and its components remain steadfast in their commitment to protect the safety of the American people.

"As the nation's risk advisor, CISA is coordinating across the federal government, with our state and local partners, and with the private sector to assess COVID-19's impact-19 on our nation's critical infrastructure", said CISA Director Christopher Krebs. "We're using our partnerships and expertise to send out useful infrastructure resilience guidance, help local leaders identify and protect those workers that are essential to the continuity of critical services and the nation's supply chain, as well as share tips on how to telework securely and avoid rising cyber scams. CISA will continue to work with our partners to preserve the services we all rely on while slowing the spread in order to keep the American people safe."

Below is a list of some of DHS's efforts against COVID-19 last week:

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Prioritizing Public Health and Safety. On April 30th, the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security extended the temporary postponement of Migrant Protection Protocols (MPP) due to circumstances stemming from COVID-19. Hearings scheduled through and including June 1, 2020 will be rescheduled for a later date. This extension will ensure that individuals 'have their day in court' while also protecting the health and safety of aliens, law enforcement, immigration court professionals, and U.S. citizens

Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD)

Enhanced Screenings at Airports. CWMD contract personnel are continuing to support the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) with enhanced screenings for travelers through 13 specially designated airports. As of May 3rd, CWMD has processed more than 283,914 travelers for enhanced screening, including 1,506 who were referred to CDC for further medical evaluation.

Customs and Border Protection (CBP)

Facilitating the Departure of Non-Citizens from the Country. Over the past week, CBP facilitated the departure of over 1,100 foreign nationals from the U.S., including 200 Iraqis and 900 South Africans, who arrived safely in their home countries. These repatriation efforts are performed in close coordination with foreign governments to ensure that non-citizens avoid unforeseen hardships or any potential violation of U.S. immigration law as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Stepping Up Coastal Patrols to Curb Maritime Smuggling. Border Patrol announced on

April 27th that it is strengthening its presence along California's coastline to combat against human and drug trafficking. This effort concurrently prevents any further introduction of COVID-19 into California communities.

Seizing Counterfeit Goods from Foreign Sources. Ensuring the integrity of imported goods, including personal protection equipment (PPE), is a vital function that CBP performs every day to protect the American public during the pandemic. On May 1st, CBP announced that it seized a record number of counterfeit COVID-19 tests over the past 45 days including: 62 seizures in Cincinnati containing 29,438 test kits; 11 seizures in Chicago containing 1,147 test kits; 2 seizures in Indianapolis containing 4,650 test kits; and 16 seizures in Louisville containing 187 test kits. These seizures had a domestic value of more than \$600,000.

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Protecting Critical Workers While Reopening the Economy. FEMA is coordinating the distribution of disposable face coverings for critical infrastructure workers as part of a multi-pronged effort to re-open the U.S. economy while continuing to limit the spread of COVID-19. As of May 1st, FEMA has allocated more than 50 million facial coverings to states, tribes, and territories, with priority given to critical infrastructure sectors including emergency services, food production and distribution, and other sectors that support community lifelines.

Ensuring that Nursing Homes Have Medical Supplies. FEMA released a fact sheet on May 2nd outlining how the agency will supplement existing efforts to ensure nursing homes across the country have PPE during the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes coordinating

two shipments totaling a 14-day supply of PPE to more than 15,000 Medicaid-and-Medicare-certified nursing homes based on input from the American Health Care Association.

Bolstering Response Efforts Through Foreign Partnerships. In an effort to grow the Nation's limited medical supplies, FEMA's Office of International Affairs is working closely with the State Department to retrieve shipments from foreign partners across the globe. Over the past week, the agency offloaded two Turkish and two Taiwanese cargo planes carrying PPE and facilitated the receipt of 50 million hydroxychloroquine tablets from India, which has been cited by the CDC as a possible treatment for COVID-19 symptoms.

Aiding Americans Who Are in Crisis. On May 2nd, FEMA announced the approval of 30 states and the District of Columbia for its Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program. The program helps fund state-provided crisis counseling services to residents struggling with stress and anxiety as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. FEMA previously funded more than \$6 million in crisis counseling in six other states.

Coordinating Air Flights to Address Medical Supply Shortages. FEMA continues to expedite the movement of critical supplies, including masks, respirators, gloves, goggles, and surgical gowns, from the global market to medical distributors in various locations across the U.S. This historic partnership with the private sector is named Project Air-Bridge. Between April 26th and May 2nd, 27 international flights arrived in the U.S. with critical medical supplies, bringing the total to 112 with an additional 23 scheduled or in transit. These flights deliver PPE to areas of greatest need through prioritized distributor supply chains nine times faster than movement by sea.

Federal Law Enforcement Training Centers (FLETC)

Planning to Safely Resume Training. FLETC held virtual town hall meetings with its staff and 95+ participating organizations to discuss plans to safely resume training. Some of the measures the agency plans to implement include screening staff and students, resizing classes into smaller blocks, social distancing protocols, continuing enhanced cleaning and sanitation processes, lodging students in single-occupancy dorms, and more.

Preparing Students for Training Resumption: FLETC provided online refresher training for 24 agencies that had basic training students enrolled in the Criminal Investigator, Uniformed Police, and Land Management Training programs. Additionally, FLETC provided in-service training for 66 instructional staff on how to deliver curriculums to students in an online format.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

Cracking Down on Fraud and Criminal Activity. On April 28th, ICE's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) unit in Atlantic City seized approximately 242,000 fraudulent N95 respirator masks, 900 fraudulent Tyvek protective suits, and 11 million fraudulent disposable face masks. It also seized 900 fraudulent bottles of diluted Clorox bleach in Nogales, Arizona on April 30th. These seizures are part of an interagency enforcement campaign known as Operation Stolen Promise, which was launched by ICE on April 15th to combat COVID-19-related fraud and other criminal activity. To date, ICE has opened more than 260 investigations nationwide.

Raising Public Awareness Around Fraud and Abuse.ICE launched a dedicated "Operation Stolen Promise" web page on April 28th to provide information to the public on COVID-

19-related fraud schemes. The page highlights the investigative efforts the agency is taking to counter the threat posed by individuals and criminal organizations seeking to exploit the pandemic for financial gain. It also provides facts, tips, and red flags, and guides the public on how to recognize potential fraud, protect themselves, and report tips to the authorities.

Office of Operations Coordination (OPS)

Supporting Information-Sharing Activities. On April 28th, an Operations Deputies Board (OPSDEPS) consisting of DHS senior operational leaders was convened to continue discussion and coordination on the Department's response to COVID-19. The OPSDEPS reviewed CISA and CWMD initiatives regarding their specific efforts to combat the coronavirus and identified potential linkages to these activities for optimization.

Science and Technology (S&T)

Arming the Nation with Scientific Research. On April 27rd, the S&T Probabilistic Analysis for National Threats, Hazards, and Risks (PANTHR) program released a PANTHR COVID-19 fact sheet highlighting current research efforts overseen and executed by DHS S&T. This fact sheet includes answers to critical questions about COVID-19 and details the latest results from research conducted at S&T's National Bioforensic Analysis and Countermeasures Center. This fact sheet will receive updates on a periodic basis as new information emerges.

Driving Evidence-Based Policymaking. On April 28th, S&T updated its Master Question List (MQL), a compilation of available research on operationally-relevant questions to aid decision makers in the COVID-19 response. The MQL is a quick-reference guide covering what is known about the virus, what additional information is needed, and who may be working to address these fundamental questions. New entries include references to studies showing individuals becoming infectious 1-3 days prior to symptom onset and confirming the presence of COVID-19 in domestic cats.

Transportation Security Administration (TSA)

Keeping Americans Safe While Ensuring Continuity of U.S. Travel. TSA continues to follow CDC guidance to protect its workers and the nation's transportation system, while ensuring the freedom of movement for people and commerce will not be impeded during the pandemic. 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Protecting Critical Workers While Reopening the Economy. FEMA is coordinating the distribution of disposable face coverings for critical infrastructure workers as part of a multi-pronged effort to re-open the U.S. economy while continuing to limit the spread of COVID-19. As of May 1st, FEMA has allocated more than 50 million facial coverings to states, tribes, and territories, with priority given to critical infrastructure sectors including emergency services, food production and distribution, and other sectors that support community lifelines.

Ensuring that Nursing Homes Have Medical Supplies. FEMA released a fact sheet on May 2nd outlining how the agency will supplement existing efforts to ensure nursing homes across the country have PPE during the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes coordinating

two shipments totaling a 14-day supply of PPE to more than 15,000 Medicaid-and-Medicare-certified nursing homes based on input from the American Health Care Association.

Bolstering Response Efforts Through Foreign Partnerships. In an effort to grow the Nation's limited medical supplies, FEMA's Office of International Affairs is working closely with the State Department to retrieve shipments from foreign partners across the globe. Over the past week, the agency offloaded two Turkish and two Taiwanese cargo planes carrying PPE and facilitated the receipt of 50 million hydroxychloroquine tablets from India, which has been cited by the CDC as a possible treatment for COVID-19 symptoms.

Aiding Americans Who Are in Crisis. On May 2nd, FEMA announced the approval of 30 states and the District of Columbia for its Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program. The program helps fund state-provided crisis counseling services to residents struggling with stress and anxiety as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. FEMA previously funded more than \$6 million in crisis counseling in six other states.

Coordinating Air Flights to Address Medical Supply Shortages. FEMA continues to expedite the movement of critical supplies, including masks, respirators, gloves, goggles, and surgical gowns, from the global market to medical distributors in various locations across the U.S. This historic partnership with the private sector is named Project Air-Bridge. Between April 26th and May 2nd, 27 international flights arrived in the U.S. with critical medical supplies, bringing the total to 112 with an additional 23 scheduled or in transit. These flights deliver PPE to areas of greatest need through prioritized distributor supply chains nine times faster than movement by sea.

Federal Law Enforcement Training Centers (FLETC)

Planning to Safely Resume Training. FLETC held virtual town hall meetings with its staff and 95+ participating organizations to discuss plans to safely resume training. Some of the measures the agency plans to implement include screening staff and students, resizing classes into smaller blocks, social distancing protocols, continuing enhanced cleaning and sanitation processes, lodging students in single-occupancy dorms, and more.

Preparing Students for Training Resumption: FLETC provided online refresher training for 24 agencies that had basic training students enrolled in the Criminal Investigator, Uniformed Police, and Land Management Training programs. Additionally, FLETC provided in-service training for 66 instructional staff on how to deliver curriculums to students in an online format.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

Cracking Down on Fraud and Criminal Activity. On April 28th, ICE's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) unit in Atlantic City seized approximately 242,000 fraudulent N95 respirator masks, 900 fraudulent Tyvek protective suits, and 11 million fraudulent disposable face masks. It also seized 900 fraudulent bottles of diluted Clorox bleach in Nogales, Arizona on April 30th. These seizures are part of an interagency enforcement campaign known as Operation Stolen Promise, which was launched by ICE on April 15th to combat COVID-19-related fraud and other criminal activity. To date, ICE has opened more than 260 investigations nationwide.

Raising Public Awareness Around Fraud and Abuse. ICE launched a dedicated "Operation Stolen Promise" web page on April 28th to provide information to the public on COVID-

19-related fraud schemes. The page highlights the investigative efforts the agency is taking to counter the threat posed by individuals and criminal organizations seeking to exploit the pandemic for financial gain. It also provides facts, tips, and red flags, and guides the public on how to recognize potential fraud, protect themselves, and report tips to the authorities.

Office of Operations Coordination (OPS)

Supporting Information-Sharing Activities. On April 28th, an Operations Deputies Board (OPSDEPS) consisting of DHS senior operational leaders was convened to continue discussion and coordination on the Department's response to COVID-19. The OPSDEPS reviewed CISA and CWMD initiatives regarding their specific efforts to combat the coronavirus and identified potential linkages to these activities for optimization.

Science and Technology (S&T)

Arming the Nation with Scientific Research. On April 27rd, the S&T Probabilistic Analysis for National Threats, Hazards, and Risks (PANTHR) program released a PANTHR COVID-19 fact sheet highlighting current research efforts overseen and executed by DHS S&T. This fact sheet includes answers to critical questions about COVID-19 and details the latest results from research conducted at S&T's National Bioforensic Analysis and Countermeasures Center. This fact sheet will receive updates on a periodic basis as new information emerges.

Driving Evidence-Based Policymaking. On April 28th, S&T updated its Master Question List (MQL), a compilation of available research on operationally-relevant questions to aid decision makers in the COVID-19 response. The MQL is a quick-reference guide covering what is known about the virus, what additional information is needed, and who may be working to address these fundamental questions. New entries include references to studies showing individuals becoming infectious 1-3 days prior to symptom onset and confirming the presence of COVID-19 in domestic cats.

Transportation Security Administration (TSA)

Keeping Americans Safe While Ensuring Continuity of U.S. Travel. TSA continues to follow CDC guidance to protect its workers and the nation's transportation system, while ensuring the freedom of movement for people and commerce will not be impeded during the pandemic. Between April 26th and May 2nd, TSA screened nearly 940,000 travelers who have all reached their destinations safely.

As President Trump has stated previously, border control, travel restrictions, and other limitations remain critical to slowing the spread of COVID-19 and allowing for the phased opening of the country.

Building the Wall and Deterring Illegal Immigration. On April 22nd, CBP launched a border wall systemwebpage that features a construction video and an interactive map. This website not only gives American taxpayers a first-hand look at the ongoing border wall construction, but it also serves as a strong visual deterrent to those in coronavirus-impacted countries who are contemplating making the dangerous and deadly journey to the U.S. across the Southern border.

Seizing Counterfeit Goods from Foreign Sources. On April 23rd, CBP officials seized 2,000

counterfeit respirators that were shipped to the U.S. from China. Ensuring the integrity of imported goods, including personal protection equipment (PPE), is a vital function that CBP performs every day to protect the American public during the pandemic.

Supporting the Safe Return of U.S. Citizens Stranded Overseas. As of April 26th, CBP, in close coordination with the State Department's Repatriation Task Force, has facilitated the return of more than 69,000 Americans back to the U.S. from 128 countries. This interagency operation is vital to reuniting families and keeping Americans out of harm's way.

Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)

Promoting Integrity and Security in Upcoming Elections. CISA continues to coordinate with government and industry partners to ensure upcoming elections are accessible and secure for voters. On April 22nd, CISA's COVID-19 Elections Working Group, which is comprised of state, local, and private sector partners, released two new products focused on voter outreach, education, and best practices to ensure that every ballot is delivered properly to voter residences.

Ensuring that Operation Centers and Control Rooms Remain Viable. On April 23rd, CISA released the Critical Infrastructure Operations Centers and Control Rooms Guide for Pandemic Response, which is geared towards all 16 critical infrastructure sectors identified by the federal government. The guide provides considerations and mitigation measures for operation centers and control rooms, but can be applied further to any critical node that is required to continue functioning in a pandemic environment.

Keeping the Healthcare Industry Safe and Secure. CISA, Health and Human Services (HHS), and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) jointly released abulletin April 24th regarding potential threats to the healthcare industry and resources on how to mitigate these threats.

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Accelerating Antibody Research Efforts. On April 20th, FEMA's Medical Countermeasures Task Force reported that it established six agreements with healthcare providers to obtain convalescent plasma from COVID-19 survivors in support of the CDC's Serology Project Team's research efforts. Convalescent plasma, which is the liquid part of blood that possibly contains viral antibodies, is being investigated by medical researchers as a potential treatment for COVID-19.

Bolstering Testing Capacity at Food Processing Centers. On April 20th, FEMA's Laboratory Diagnostics Task Force coordinated with the Region VII office to deliver 7,000 test kits to Kansas where the region's largest meat processing facilities are experiencing clusters of COVID-19 infections. These diagnostic supplies will help identify infections more rapidly while preventing its transmission throughout the state's critical agriculture infrastructure, which processes a significant portion of the nation's meat supply.

Addressing Medical Supply Needs in Non-Healthcare Settings. On April 22nd, FEMA publishedguidance to address how organizations in non-healthcare settings should consider and manage their personal protective equipment (PPE) needs while ensuring the protection of workers during the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes how topreserve limited supplies of PPE, how to consider needs during periods of shortages, and how to acquire and request PPE (i.e., in the face of critical shortages and whereas normal supply chain allocation cannot meet operational requirements).

Deploying Federal Funds in Support of State Response Efforts. Federal funds are being deployed to help ensure that health care providers have the critical resources they need to provide rapid care and treatment to COVID-19 patients in hard-hit areas across the U.S. Since April 20th, FEMA has obligated around \$400 million to support state response efforts, bringing the total amount to \$6.1 billion thus far. This includes an additional \$100 million in funding for the Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program to help first responders access PPE and other critical medical supplies during the outbreak. Increasing Availability of Critical Resources. As a part of the Supply Chain Stabilization Task Force, FEMA is executing a whole-of-nation approach to address the limited supply of critical and life-saving equipment. As of April 25th, FEMA has coordinated the delivery of the following to critical locations: 70.7 million N95 respirators, 104.5 million surgical masks, 7 million face shields, 14.7 million surgical gowns, 793.8 million gloves, and 10,603 ventilators. FEMA's Health Care Resilience Task Force is also working with private manufacturers to address dialysis fluid shortages in New York City, which is critical for COVID-19 patients in ICU's who are experiencing kidney failure.

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Implementing Protocols to Protect Returning Students. Although FLETC has temporarily paused in-person operations, the agency is engaged in detailed planning efforts to resume law enforcement training in the COVID-environment. Over the past week, FLETC piloted new screening procedures whereby security contractors are conducting temperature checks and asking COVID-related screening questions of all people attempting to enter FLETC's facilities. It has also begun to clean and disinfect all venues in preparation for students' return.

These flights deliver PPE to areas of greatest need through prioritized distributor supply chains nine times faster than movement by sea.

FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING CENTERS (FLETC)

Implementing Protocols to Protect Returning Students. Although FLETC has temporarily paused in-person operations, the agency is engaged in detailed planning efforts to resume law enforcement training in the COVID-environment. Over the past week, FLETC piloted new screening procedures whereby security contractors are conducting temperature checks and asking COVID-related screening questions of all people attempting to enter FLETC's facilities. It has also begun to clean and disinfect all venues in preparation for students' return.

IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT (ICE)

Cracking Down on Fraud and Criminal Activity. On April 20th, ICE's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) unit, with assistance from CBP's Field Intelligence Group, seized approximately 5,300 potentially fraudulent COVID-19 test kits. This seizure is a part of an interagency enforcement campaign known as Operation Stolen Promise, which was launched by ICE on April 15th to combat COVID-19-related fraud and other criminal activity. To date, ICE has opened more than 190 investigations nationwide.

INTELLIGENCE & ANALYSIS (I&A)

Educating the Public About Cyber-Related Threats. On April 24th, I&A and CISA partnered with the American Hospital Association to<u>launch a podcast mini-series</u> addressing cyber threats that put the U.S. health system at risk. It offers best practices to security experts and health care administrators who are responsible for the infrastructure supporting medical providers during the COVID-19 response.

SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY (S&T)

Arming the Nation with Scientific Research. On April 23rd, William Bryan, Senior Official

Performing the Duties of the Under Secretary for Science and Technology (S&T), provided an update on key research findings from S&T's National Biodefense Analysis and Countermeasures Center (NBACC) at the White House Coronavirus Task Force briefing. His update covered emerging results and trends from studies conducted at NBACC including the effects of sunlight and humidity on the virus as well as findings on common disinfectants that can kill the virus.

Driving Evidence-Based Policymaking. On April 24th, S&T updated its Master Question List (MQL), a compilation of available research on operationally-relevant questions to aid decision makers in the COVID-19 response. The MQL is a quick-reference guide covering what is known about the virus, what additional information is needed, and who may be working to address these fundamental questions. New entries include references to how much agent will make a healthy individual ill, how the virus spreads from one host to another, and what treatments are effective.

TRANSPORTATION SECURITY ADMINISTRATION (TSA)

Keeping Americans Safe While Ensuring Continuity of U.S. Travel. TSA continues to follow CDC guidance to protect its workers and the nation's transportation system, while ensuring the freedom of movement for people and commerce will not be impeded during the pandemic. Between April 20th and April 26th, TSA screened nearly 640,721 travelers who have all reached their destinations safely.

U.S. CITIZENSHIP AND IMMIGRATION SERVICES (USCIS)

Target Date to Reopen Offices. On April 24th, USCISannounced that offices temporarily suspended will begin to reopen on June 4th unless the public closures are extended further to help slow the spread of COVID-19. Employees in these offices are continuing to perform mission-essential services that do not require face-to-face contact with the public while the offices are closed.

United States Coast Guard (USCG)

Monitoring Vessels that Pose a Risk to Public Health. The Coast Guard is working non-stop to protect the health and safety of the American public while keeping U.S. supply chains open and viable. Between April 20th and April 26th, USCG tracked 110 commercial vessels that departed from a coronavirus-impacted country and was scheduled to arrive at a U.S. port. In accordance with the Coast Guard's latest Maritime Safety Information Bulletin (MSIB), which was updated on April 24th, all vessels destined for a U.S. port are required to report to the CDC any sick or deceased crew/passengers prior to arrival at a U.S. port or they will be denied entry into U.S. territorial waters.

Facilitating the Offload of Cruise Ships. Between April 20th and April 26th, the Coast Guard facilitated the offload of 119 passengers aboard the Pacific Princess cruise ship in Los Angeles and 103 crew members aboard the Grand Princess cruise ship in San Francisco. The passengers and crew were allowed to disembark from the ships after the Coast Guard determined they were not infected with COVID-19 or other infectious diseases. To date, the Coast Guard has facilitated the discharge of over 265,000 passengers from over 125 cruise ships.

United States Secret Service(USSS)

Protecting Americans From Financial Scams. On April 20th, the Secret Service partnered with the U.S. Treasury to launch the "Know Your U.S. Treasury Check" campaign – an initiative to bring awareness to citizens, retailers, and financial institutions on how to protect themselves from scams associated with U.S. Treasury checks funded by the \$2

trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act.

Weekly Update: DHS Response to COVID-19

WASHINGTON –For months, the Department of Homeland Security has undertaken an aggressive and herculean response to minimize the impact of COVID-19 on American citizens and workers. From private industry to local government, every organ of society has been and will continue to be leveraged to protect the American public from irreparable harm. As we begin moving toward reopening the country, the Department and its components remain steadfast in their commitment to protect the safety of the American people.

"As the nation's risk advisor, CISA is coordinating across the federal government, with our state and local partners, and with the private sector to assess COVID-19's impact-19 on our nation's critical infrastructure", said CISA Director Christopher Krebs. "We're using our partnerships and expertise to send out useful infrastructure resilience guidance, help local leaders identify and protect those workers that are essential to the continuity of critical services and the nation's supply chain, as well as share tips on how to telework securely and avoid rising cyber scams. CISA will continue to work with our partners to preserve the services we all rely on while slowing the spread in order to keep the American people safe."

Below is a list of some of DHS's efforts against COVID-19 last week:

Interagency Collaboration

Prioritizing Public Health and Safety. On April 30th, the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security extended the temporary postponement of Migrant Protection Protocols (MPP) due to circumstances stemming from COVID-19. Hearings scheduled through and including June 1, 2020 will be rescheduled for a later date. This extension will ensure that individuals 'have their day in court' while also protecting the health and safety of aliens, law enforcement, immigration court professionals, and U.S. citizens

Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD)

Enhanced Screenings at Airports. CWMD contract personnel are continuing to support the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) with enhanced screenings for travelers through 13 specially designated airports. As of May 3rd, CWMD has processed more than 283,914 travelers for enhanced screening, including 1,506 who were referred to CDC for further medical evaluation.

Customs and Border Protection (CBP)

Facilitating the Departure of Non-Citizens from the Country. Over the past week, CBP facilitated the departure of over 1,100 foreign nationals from the U.S., including 200 Iraqis and 900 South Africans, who arrived safely in their home countries. These repatriation efforts are performed in close coordination with foreign governments to ensure that non-citizens avoid unforeseen hardships or any potential violation of U.S. immigration law as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Stepping Up Coastal Patrols to Curb Maritime Smuggling. Border Patrol announced on

April 27th that it is strengthening its presence along California's coastline to combat against human and drug trafficking. This effort concurrently prevents any further introduction of COVID-19 into California communities.

Seizing Counterfeit Goods from Foreign Sources. Ensuring the integrity of imported goods, including personal protection equipment (PPE), is a vital function that CBP performs every day to protect the American public during the pandemic. On May 1st, CBP announced that it seized a record number of counterfeit COVID-19 tests over the past 45 days including: 62 seizures in Cincinnati containing 29,438 test kits; 11 seizures in Chicago containing 1,147 test kits; 2 seizures in Indianapolis containing 4,650 test kits; and 16 seizures in Louisville containing 187 test kits. These seizures had a domestic value of more than \$600,000.

Supporting the Safe Return of U.S. Citizens Stranded Overseas. As of May 3rd, CBP, in close coordination with the State Department's Repatriation Task Force, has facilitated the return of more than 76,000 Americans back to the U.S. from 126 countries. This interagency operation is vital to reuniting families and keeping Americans out of harm's way.

Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)

Ensuring Free-Movement of Critical Workers. On April 28th, CISA published the <u>Situation</u> Reporting System which provides a secure web-enabled means of reporting denied movement situations for critical infrastructure workers. For the purposes of this system, a denied movement situation occurs anytime an individual or entity believes they are considered an essential worker under the local definition and was denied the ability to move around to conduct activities the local authorities have determined are authorized.

Protecting Networks and Cloud Environments from Intrusions. On May 1st, CISA launched a dedicated telework product lineintended to advise and support businesses and organizations with the surge in telework due to COVID-19. Thenew products include a joint CISA and National Security Agency (NSA) Telework Best Practices guide, in addition tocybersecurity considerations for use of video conferencing software and related collaboration tools.

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

Helping Organizations and Businesses Resume Operations. FEMA released afact sheet on April 30thoutlining measures for organizations and businesses to consider so that they are well-positioned to protect their employees and communities whenever they resume operations. The fact sheet builds upon the White House guidelines for Opening Up America by providing further recommendations for state, local, tribal, territorial, and private sector stakeholders.

Protecting Critical Workers While Reopening the Economy. FEMA is coordinating the distribution of disposable face coverings for critical infrastructure workers as part of a multi-pronged effort to re-open the U.S. economy while continuing to limit the spread of COVID-19. As of May 1st, FEMA has allocated more than 50 million facial coverings to states, tribes, and territories, with priority given to critical infrastructure sectors including emergency services, food production and distribution, and other sectors that support community lifelines.

Ensuring that Nursing Homes Have Medical Supplies. FEMA released a fact sheet on May 2nd outlining how the agency will supplement existing efforts to ensure nursing homes across the country have PPE during the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes coordinating

two shipments totaling a 14-day supply of PPE to more than 15,000 Medicaid-and-Medicare-certified nursing homes based on input from the American Health Care Association.

Bolstering Response Efforts Through Foreign Partnerships. In an effort to grow the Nation's limited medical supplies, FEMA's Office of International Affairs is working closely with the State Department to retrieve shipments from foreign partners across the globe. Over the past week, the agency offloaded two Turkish and two Taiwanese cargo planes carrying PPE and facilitated the receipt of 50 million hydroxychloroquine tablets from India, which has been cited by the CDC as a possible treatment for COVID-19 symptoms.

Aiding Americans Who Are in Crisis. On May 2nd, FEMA announced the approval of 30 states and the District of Columbia for its Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program. The program helps fund state-provided crisis counseling services to residents struggling with stress and anxiety as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. FEMA previously funded more than \$6 million in crisis counseling in six other states.

Coordinating Air Flights to Address Medical Supply Shortages. FEMA continues to expedite the movement of critical supplies, including masks, respirators, gloves, goggles, and surgical gowns, from the global market to medical distributors in various locations across the U.S. This historic partnership with the private sector is named Project Air-Bridge. Between April 26th and May 2nd, 27 international flights arrived in the U.S. with critical medical supplies, bringing the total to 112 with an additional 23 scheduled or in transit. These flights deliver PPE to areas of greatest need through prioritized distributor supply chains nine times faster than movement by sea.

Federal Law Enforcement Training Centers (FLETC)

Planning to Safely Resume Training. FLETC held virtual town hall meetings with its staff and 95+ participating organizations to discuss plans to safely resume training. Some of the measures the agency plans to implement include screening staff and students, resizing classes into smaller blocks, social distancing protocols, continuing enhanced cleaning and sanitation processes, lodging students in single-occupancy dorms, and more.

Preparing Students for Training Resumption: FLETC provided online refresher training for 24 agencies that had basic training students enrolled in the Criminal Investigator, Uniformed Police, and Land Management Training programs. Additionally, FLETC provided in-service training for 66 instructional staff on how to deliver curriculums to students in an online format.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

Cracking Down on Fraud and Criminal Activity. On April 28th, ICE's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) unit in Atlantic City seized approximately 242,000 fraudulent N95 respirator masks, 900 fraudulent Tyvek protective suits, and 11 million fraudulent disposable face masks. It also seized 900 fraudulent bottles of diluted Clorox bleach in Nogales, Arizona on April 30th. These seizures are part of an interagency enforcement campaign known as Operation Stolen Promise, which was launched by ICE on April 15th to combat COVID-19-related fraud and other criminal activity. To date, ICE has opened more than 260 investigations nationwide.

Raising Public Awareness Around Fraud and Abuse. ICE launched a dedicated "Operation Stolen Promise" web page on April 28th to provide information to the public on COVID-

19-related fraud schemes. The page highlights the investigative efforts the agency is taking to counter the threat posed by individuals and criminal organizations seeking to exploit the pandemic for financial gain. It also provides facts, tips, and red flags, and guides the public on how to recognize potential fraud, protect themselves, and report tips to the authorities.

Office of Operations Coordination (OPS)

Supporting Information-Sharing Activities. On April 28th, an Operations Deputies Board (OPSDEPS) consisting of DHS senior operational leaders was convened to continue discussion and coordination on the Department's response to COVID-19. The OPSDEPS reviewed CISA and CWMD initiatives regarding their specific efforts to combat the coronavirus and identified potential linkages to these activities for optimization.

Science and Technology (S&T)

Arming the Nation with Scientific Research. On April 27rd, the S&T Probabilistic Analysis for National Threats, Hazards, and Risks (PANTHR) program released a PANTHR COVID-19 fact sheet highlighting current research efforts overseen and executed by DHS S&T. This fact sheet includes answers to critical questions about COVID-19 and details the latest results from research conducted at S&T's National Bioforensic Analysis and Countermeasures Center. This fact sheet will receive updates on a periodic basis as new information emerges.

Driving Evidence-Based Policymaking. On April 28th, S&T updated its Master Question List (MQL), a compilation of available research on operationally-relevant questions to aid decision makers in the COVID-19 response. The MQL is a quick-reference guide covering what is known about the virus, what additional information is needed, and who may be working to address these fundamental questions. New entries include references to studies showing individuals becoming infectious 1-3 days prior to symptom onset and confirming the presence of COVID-19 in domestic cats.

Transportation Security Administration (TSA)

Keeping Americans Safe While Ensuring Continuity of U.S. Travel. TSA continues to follow CDC guidance to protect its workers and the nation's transportation system, while ensuring the freedom of movement for people and commerce will not be impeded during the pandemic. Between April 26th and May 2nd, TSA screened nearly 940,000 travelers who have all reached their destinations safely.

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS)

Providing Flexibility to Individuals and Employers. USCIS announced on May 1st that it is extending its deadline for applicants responding to requests for evidence, continuations to request evidence, notices of intent to deny, notices of intent to revoke, notices of intent to rescind and notices of intent to terminate regional investment centers, and filing date requirements for Form I-290B, Notice of Appeal or Motion. Applicants and petitioners now have an additional 60 calendar days after the deadline listed in agency requests, notices, or decisions dated between March 1 and July 1 to respond before USCIS takes any action.

United States Coast Guard (USCG)

Thank you for your efforts in the whole-of-America approach to respond to COVID-19 and plan for America's economic recovery including implementation of robust testing plans. Over the past several governors briefings with the President and Vice President, governors have shared best practices on leading their entire testing ecosystem, including scaling and utilizing all testing capacity, improving transparency on all testing options, expanding testing in nursing homes and prisons, and bolstering contact tracing and surveillance.

Your state health official(s) has received a similar email with this information from the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC). I wanted to ensure you all received this information as well.

On April 20, each governor and staff received state-by-state testing platform information that included a state-specific high and low throughput machine location map and location details. Since then, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), CDC, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and the White House have conducted one-on-one technical assistance calls with states.

This email provides details on testing supplies (i.e., swabs, transport media) being distributed to your state to support enhanced testing efforts in partnership with you all. We appreciate your team providing your state's shipping address for swabs and media, logistics point of contact, and lab testing supplies point of contact.

Over the past several governors briefings with the President and Vice President, governors have shared best practices on leading their entire testing ecosystem, including scaling and utilizing all testing capacity, improving transparency on all testing options, expanding testing in nursing homes and prisons, and bolstering contact tracing and surveillance.

Your state health official(s) has received a similar email with this information from the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC). I wanted to ensure you all received this information as well.

On April 20, each governor and staff received state-by-state testing platform information that included a state-specific high and low throughput machine location map and location details. Since then, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), CDC, Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and the White House have conducted one-on-one technical assistance calls with states.

This email provides details on testing supplies (i.e., swabs, transport media) being distributed to your state to support enhanced testing efforts in partnership with you all. We appreciate your team providing your state's shipping address for swabs and media, logistics point of contact, and lab testing supplies point of contact.

Gov. Henry McMaster to Lift "Work-or-Home" Order May 4th Outdoor Dining Service for Restaurants to Start May 4th

COLUMBIA, **S.C.** – Governor Henry McMaster today announced that the statewide "Work-or-Home" order will be lifted and returned to voluntary status on Monday, May 4th. The governor also announced that beginning on May 4th, restaurants throughout South Carolina may provide outdoor customer dining service in addition to existing take out, curbside, and delivery services.

The governor also announced that he has lifted <u>Executive Order 2020-19</u> because CDC guidance identifying "hotspots" throughout the country, which constituted the basis upon which short term rental companies were to deny reservations, has since lapsed and was not renewed. The governor has also lifted <u>Executive Order 2020-14</u>, which required individuals entering the state from the same "hotspots" to self-quarantine for two weeks.

Governor McMaster and state epidemiologist Dr. Linda Bell strongly urged anyone considered to be "at-risk" based on CDC guidance to limit exposure to others and for all South Carolinians to continue prioritizing their travels between home and work, when possible. Anybody who is sick or is showing symptoms of COVID-19 should immediately contact a healthcare provider and self-quarantine for a minimum of 14 days.

"Our goal from the onset of this deadly pandemic has been to protect South Carolinians, but as

we all know, the state's economic health is a major component of the state's public health," said Gov. Henry McMaster. "South Carolinians, now more than ever, should be vigilant in protecting themselves, their loved ones, and their communities by practicing social distancing and continuing to follow the advice and recommendations from our public health experts."

"This virus will continue to spread and still presents a very real and serious threat to our people, but I believe in South Carolinians and their ability to act wisely and safely," the governor continued. "We are a strong, resilient, and compassionate people who care for one another and will act in the best interest of our state as a whole."

The governor's announcement follows a week of meetings of <u>AccelerateSC</u> – a group created by the governor to develop a coordinated economic revitalization plan which includes healthcare professionals, representatives from large and small businesses, local government officials, and education professionals.

Based on advice and recommendations from DHEC and the South Carolina Restaurant & Lodging Association, Governor McMaster has established the following guidelines for restaurants to follow if they choose to open for outdoor seating.

Existing approved outdoor seating areas:

- Tables are to be spaced a minimum of 8 feet from each other (measured from all edges of the table);
- Limit table groups to 8 individuals;
- Eliminate gatherings in the building when entering or exiting outdoor seating area;
- Maintain strict social/physical distancing guidelines;
- Tables, chairs, and seats should be sanitized after every customer

If open areas and/or temporary tents are utilized by existing, permitted restaurants, all sides of the tent must be open and the following conditions are required:

- Tables are to be spaced a minimum of 8 feet from each other (measured from all edges of the table);
- Table groups are to be limited to 8 individuals;
- State approved fire extinguisher within 75 feet of tent area;
- Minimum of 7-foot-6 inch head room (ceiling height)

DHEC Distributes Additional Supplies to Help Expand COVID-19 Rapid-Testing Across the State

COLUMBIA, S.C. – The S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) is helping to expand COVID-19 testing capabilities for the novel coronavirus COVID-19 by deploying rapid-testing devices and testing supplies to areas of the state where testing for the virus may be limited.

The Abbott ID NOW COVID-19 rapid-response test recently received emergency use authorization from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to test specimens for COVID-19, and South Carolina received 15 of the devices from U.S. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). DHEC deployed the devices and a limited amount of testing supplies to 15 health care facilities across the state last week, and today, the agency is distributing additional testing supplies to those facilities. The rapid-test devices, which can provide COVID-19 specimen results in 15-20 minutes, are in high demand around the country.

"This specialized technology will help us increase testing for those who are most susceptible to this disease and who live in areas of our state where access to COVID-19 testing isn't easily accessible," said Dr. Joan Duwve, DHEC's Director of Public Health. "We wish every health care facility in the state could be provided with these new instruments, but until then, we've prioritized their distribution to the places where we hope they can have the biggest and best impact for South Carolinians."

The rapid-response testing machines and supplies have been distributed to:

DHEC considered several factors in determining where to send these initial rapid-test devices, including regions with high numbers of positive cases; regions with rates above the state average for underlying conditions like diabetes, hypertension and chronic diseases; and a facility's capacity to use the machines to expand testing to rural communities.

The devices use the same type of nasopharyngeal specimen, or nose swab, as the traditional testing. A health care provider collects the patient's specimen, enters the specimen into the device, and results are provided in 15-20 minutes.

DHEC has requested more of the rapid-test devices and additional testing supplies but no specific timeline has been provided on when to expect a next shipment.

Thank you for your efforts in the whole-of-America approach to respond to COVID-19 and plan for America's economic recovery including implementation of robust testing plans.

Over the past several governors briefings with the President and Vice President, governors have shared best practices on leading their entire testing ecosystem, including scaling and utilizing all testing capacity, improving transparency on all testing options, expanding testing in nursing homes and prisons, and bolstering contact tracing and surveillance.

Your state health official(s) has received a similar email with this information from the Centers for Disease Control & Prevention (CDC). I wanted to ensure you all received this information as well.

On April 20, each governor and staff received state-by-state testing platform information that included a state-specific high and low throughput machine location map and location details. 

- Guidelines for Opening Up America Again: On April 16, President Trump and the White House Coronavirus Task Force unveiled new guidelines (download here) for the reopening of America. Developed by the top medical experts from across the Government and based on verifiable metrics regarding the situation on the ground, the guidelines outline a phased return to reopening and include specific steps for State, Local, and Tribal officials to follow in tailoring their response. DDSN plan to reduce band payments for waiver RE: participants living at home

Dear Governor McMaster, Mr. Baker, Ms. Poole and Chairman Lemel:

On Thursday, April 23, 2020, the South Carolina Department of Disabilities and Special Needs advised financial managers (mainly local DSN Board directors) that it's current plan is to reduce the payments made for Medicaid waiver participants who live at home by 70%, effective with the second payment made to local DSN Boards in May. As I understood the information provided at the meeting, the reason for reducing payments to local DSN Boards is that DDSN has a budget deficit for FY 2020 that is in excess of \$5 million due to the closure of congregate day programs.

According to information provided at that meeting, DDSN has not received any of the increased FMAP payments that have already been paid by the federal government to SCDHHS for the purposes set forth in the Families First Response Act that was passed by Congress on March 18, 2020.

That Act retroactively increased the federal match rate for Medicaid services in South Carolina from approximately 70% to 76.2%. Given that DDSN has only provided the draft Mercer reports, not the report that was finalized in August, 2019 (according to DDSN's Annual Accountability Report), it is difficult to calculate the amount DHHS has already received in increased retroactive FMAP funds (paid retroactively to January, 2020). For purposes of this inquiry, I have used the costs which DHHS provided in the current ID/RD and Community Support waiver applications (found on the DHHS website) for year four.

If those numbers are correct, the increased FMAP for the ID/RD waiver program should have produced an additional \$3.377 million per month for that program. The increased FMAP for the Community Supports program should have produced an additional \$421,706 per month. Given that the initial payment was retroactive to January 1, 2020, DHHS should have already received a retroactive payment of at least \$11,396,120 for the months January – March, 2020 for those two programs alone.

According to the information DDSN provided to local DSN Boards on Thursday, none of these increased FMAP payments have been passed on to DDSN, creating a budget deficit of more than \$5 million, which DDSN now plans to balance on the backs of local DSN Boards and families who are already struggling to provide additional hours care at home, given the closure of day programs funded by the waiver. The proposed reductions have not been approved by the governing board of DDSN.

DDSN has also failed to notify Medicaid waiver families of the agency's plan to reduce the band rates paid for services provided to

waiver participants living at home by 70% in less than three weeks. DDSN's plan calls for all financial managers to share in this across-the-board reduction, regardless of their production rates. This punishes those boards who have worked hard to comply with DDSN's request to provide day services in DDSN's residential settings and rewards those who have not. Given the increased costs Boards are experiencing resulting from Cov-19 due to absences, increased overtime, having to pay hazardous duty pay to cover houses infected with Cov-19 and having to pay for PPE that should be provided to waiver participants through the State Plan, threatening to reduce rates to solve DDSN's budgeting problem on such short notice, and without a public hearing, is unconscionable.

By forcing boards to reduce home-based services, DHHS risks loss of the 6.2% FMAP increase, which requires the state to continue to provide services in the "amount, duration and scope" provided prior to the enactment of the Family First Coronavirus Response Act.

I am already seeing reductions "on the ground." DDSN reduced the hours of one client who was receiving 42 hours per week of PCA II services to 10.5 hours, without explanation, and without any change in the client's need for those services. Another client's request for an additional hours of PCA services to replace the day program services he was receiving prior to the closure of DDSN's day programs was first approved for 30 additional hours per week, but later that same day reduced to 5 hours a week, claiming that the approval for an additional 30 hours a week was a "typo."

Before I send information out to families, I am requesting, Mr. Baker, that you provide the amount of the FMAP funding increase your agency has already received and that you explain why none of these funds have been paid to DDSN. When do you intend to pay those funds already received to DDSN so that they can avoid the ill-conceived and illegal plan to reduce payments for B and I band recipients?

For years, advocates have complained that the agencies' overreliance on DDSN workshops violates the ADA and the Medicaid Act and DHHS' illegal refusal to allow all providers to bill DHHS directly. Instead, DHHS and DDSN have continued to mandate that local DSN Boards involuntarily assign payments to DDSN, to be distributed according to the "bands" DDSN has established. DDSN has continued to divert funds allocated for services to build more congregate capacity, without authorization from the General Assembly. Instead of substituting services provided in integrated settings, DDSN has continued its business model of billing excessive rates for day program services, while passing on lower rates to providers.

Given the emergency nature of the pending reductions, I will appreciate your prompt response. If any of my calculations are wrong, please so advise and provide the correct amounts and the final Mercer report.

I requested a copy of the Mercer report last fall and was provided only with the two draft reports dated February 28, 2019. The SC Human Services Providers Association was also provided these draft reports on November 7, 2019, in response to their October 2, 2019 FOIA request.

However, the Annual Accountability Report that DDSN submitted to the General Assembly on September 11, 2019 states that the Mercer report was finalized in August, 2019. Page A-4. Please explain why DDSN provided only with the draft report that was sent to DHHS in February, if the report was finalized in August, 2019. If the Mercer report was not finalized in August, please advise of the agency's plan to file a corrected annual accountability report.

Also, please provide me with a copy of the finalized Mercer report via email. Given that this report was requested pursuant to FOIA months ago, I would hope that you will provide the requested report immediately, so that the analysis I am working on regarding DDSN's plan to drastically reduce home-based band payments will be accurate.
