Gentlemen,

Thank you for agreeing to assist the Saint Paul Field Division with reviewing videos captured during the nights of civil unrest in Minneapolis and Saint Paul. These videos are social media captures of the events that unfolded in the days following the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis police custody. Hundreds of commercial business fires were set and many perpetrators have been identified and captured. Thousands of videos have been attained and hundreds have already been reviewed for content.

We are asking for assistance in reviewing the videos (described in detail below) for acts of arson. Specifically we are interested in initiation of fires (often times Molotov cocktails, or burning of aerosol cans), identifiable individuals adding fuel to fires, and very early onset of fires inside businesses (b) (7)(A)

(b) (7)(A) The review of these videos is intended to be the initial and preliminary level. Our hopes is that you can assist us in sorting the few videos that do have the detail we need from the large amounts of video of the peaceful protests and riotous behavior.

For the videos that do have evidentiary value we ask that you describe briefly the nature of the activity along

with approximate time stamps and searchable key words like: (b) (7)(A) etc. Please email those comments and the name of the particular video or the excel spreadsheet line number to SA (b) (6), (b) (7)(C)@atf.gov and he (or a yet to be determined replacement) will input the data into the master excel spreadsheet itself. The spreadsheet will be made available to the case agents for follow-up and or a secondary review from agents familiar with the fire scenes. Please also list the line numbers for videos that don't have the designated evidentiary value so they can be listed as completed on the spreadsheet.

There are hotlinks in the spreadsheet but they are broken for us as we don't have the IIC mapped as our "D" drive and it is less frustrating to just find the videos in the specified folder. Also, at the request of NRT, please do not relocate the videos on the drive.

Specifically (for now) please concentrate on the "Extra Videos" folder as it corresponds to excel spreadsheet lines 310-468. The remaining other videos on the spreadsheet are going to be continued to be pushed to case agents and out of state personnel as time allows.

We understand this is a monumental undertaking and we are extremely grateful for the assistance!

I know you are exhausted. I am too. This has been a long week, not just for ATF but for the whole country. I am disgusted by the death of George Floyd and believe so was every other cop who takes seriously their oath to protect *all* law-abiding citizens, fairly and with integrity. I think it is tragic when peaceful demonstrations—a fundamental American right—are overshadowed by violence. But after 20 years, I have never been more proud to work for ATF.

I talk a lot about *how* we do our work. Crime Gun Intelligence. Policy. Training and tactics.

I talk a lot about *where* we do our work. Urban versus rural. Staffing models and crime rates. Areas of operation.

But I don't often talk about *why* we do our work. I cannot speak for you but I wanted to tell you why I do this job.

I do it for ideals. I believe in America. I revere the Constitution and believe "We the People" really means all of us, regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation,

or political philosophy. My heart swells every time I hear the national anthem. I believe in Justice.

I do it for people. For the four agents who got in a gunfight this week but told me they just want to get back to work because their communities and their partners need them. For the IOI who is scared by the unrest she sees on TV and is worried about COVID but puts on her mask and heads to work anyway because she is needed at a looted gun store. For the analyst with a 9-to-5 headquarters job that volunteered to work over the weekend *to update email distribution lists* so critical information gets to the people who need it. I do it for the Minneapolis business owner who lost everything to arson but told our NRT “the most impressive thing I’ve seen so far in all of this has been the response from ATF—thank you.” I do it because it makes my grandmother proud and I want my kids to look up to me.

I do it for our profession. I believe law enforcement is a noble calling. I get goosebumps when I hear bagpipes at police memorials. I am alarmed by the violent crime in our country and want to be part of the solution. When the public sets what feel like impossibly high expectations, I want to help us exceed them. I do it because I want to be a part of the reason people look to ATF as a model of professional law enforcement. I believe ATF agents are some of the hardest working, bravest, and most effective public servants on the planet and I am proud to be one.

I cannot speak for why you do this job, but I don’t imagine it’s just for a paycheck. Whatever your reasons, I want to say thank you for everything you have been doing, and will continue to do, to help respond to this national crisis. This has been a tough week and more may lie ahead but I believe it will make us—ATF and America—better.

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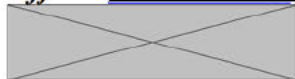

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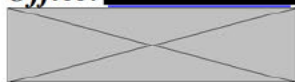

State & Local Law Enforcement Leaders,

Today, Wednesday July 22, President Donald J. Trump detailed actions to assist State and local officials in combating violent crime in American cities. Standing beside Attorney General William Barr, Acting Secretary of Homeland Security Chad Wolf, and other Federal, State and local law enforcement leaders from across the country, President Trump announced the expansion of "Operation Legend," a Department of Justice (DOJ), inter-agency surge of resources into cities across the United States that are experiencing upticks in violent crime.

Operation Legend was successfully launched on July 8 in Kansas City, where four year old LeGend Taliferro was shot and killed on June 29th. Taliferro's mother, Sharon, joined President Trump for today's announcement. "This operation is personal to us. We want justice for our son and others. We have to take a stand in our communities and speak-up to help this operation be successful," she stated in remarks.

Today's announcement expands Operation Legend to Chicago, IL and Albuquerque, NM, both of which are currently experiencing a significant increase in violent crime. As part of the expansion, the Administration – led by the Department of Justice – will significantly increase personnel and resources to help State and local officials in these cities fight the high levels of violent crime, particularly gun violence. 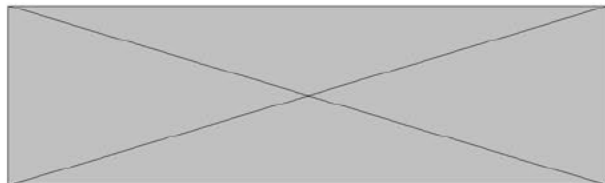

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Today, Attorney General William P. Barr joined President Donald J. Trump to announce the expansion of Operation Legend to Chicago and Albuquerque. Operation Legend is a sustained, systematic and coordinated law enforcement initiative in which federal law enforcement agencies work in conjunction with state and local law enforcement officials to fight violent crime. The Operation was first launched on July 8 in Kansas City, Missouri, as a result of President Trump's promise to assist America's cities that are plagued by recent violence.

Operation Legend is named after four-year-old LeGend Taliferro, who was shot and killed while he slept early in the morning of June 29 in Kansas City. The first federal arrest under Operation Legend was announced on July 20.

"The most basic responsibility of government is to protect the safety of our citizens," said Attorney General Barr. "Today, we have extended Operation Legend to Chicago and Albuquerque to

protect the residents of those cities from senseless acts of deadly violence by targeting those involved in gang activity and those who use guns to commit violent crime. For decades, the Department of Justice has achieved significant success when utilizing our anti-violent crime task forces and federal law enforcement agents to enforce federal law and assist American cities which are experiencing upticks in violent crime. The Department of Justice's assets will supplement local law enforcement efforts, as we work together to take the shooters and chronic violent criminals off of our streets."

As part of Operation Legend, Attorney General Barr directed the FBI, U.S. Marshals Service, DEA, and ATF to significantly increase resources into Chicago and Albuquerque in the coming weeks to help state and local officials fight high levels of violent crime, particularly gun violence. Chicago is currently experiencing a significant increase in violent crime, with homicides currently up 51 percent over 2019. Over the weekend of July 17, more than 60 people were shot in the city of Chicago, with 14 fatalities. Similarly, Albuquerque is currently on pace to break 2019's record for homicides in the city. On the weekend of July 10, there were four murders in Albuquerque within a 24-hour period.

In Chicago, the Department of Justice will supplement state and local law enforcement agencies by sending over 100 federal investigators from the FBI, DEA, and ATF to the city. Under the leadership of John R. Lausch Jr., U.S. Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois, these investigators will complement the work already underway by existing joint federal, state and local task forces focused on combating Chicago's violent gangs, gun crime, and drug trafficking organizations. The investigatory efforts will be advanced by more than 100 members of the U.S. Marshals Service Great Lakes Task Force, which will direct violent fugitive apprehension operations within Chicago to identify wanted gang members, violent criminals, and firearms violators. The Department of Homeland Security's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) are also committing at least 100 agents, already stationed in Chicago, to Operation Legend. HSI agents will conduct investigations into gangs, narcotics traffickers, violent offenders, and firearms traffickers.

To further support the Chicago Police Department in reducing violent crime, ATF has deployed its national Crime Gun Intelligence Mobile Command Vehicle to assist local law enforcement with analysis of crime scenes and spent shell casings through the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN). ATF will also make available additional resources to assist the City of Chicago in providing timely, efficient analysis of ballistic evidence from shootings in order to quickly disrupt violent criminals and prosecute those prohibited from possessing firearms under federal law.

The Bureau of Justice Assistance will make available \$3.5 million in funding to reimburse the Chicago Police Department and City of Chicago for the work of local law enforcement on the federal task forces supporting Operation Legend's violent crime reduction efforts. The COPS Office has also made \$9.375 million available to the Chicago Police Department to fund the hiring of 75 officers.

In Albuquerque, the Department of Justice will supplement state and local law enforcement agencies by sending more than 25 federal investigators from the FBI, DEA, and ATF to the city. Under the leadership of John C. Anderson, U.S. Attorney for the District of New Mexico, these federal investigators will work closely with the Albuquerque Police Department and the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department, along with other local partners, through pre-existing task forces directed at combatting violent crimes. Up to ten HSI agents will assist with the efforts in Albuquerque, as well.

The Department of Justice has also made available over \$1.5 million in COPS Hiring Grants to the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Department to onboard five deputies and to support additional federal task force officers committed to violent crime reduction efforts. Additionally, the COPS Office has made \$9.74 million available to the Albuquerque Police Department to fund the hiring of 40 officers. Separately, the Bureau of Justice Assistance has made available \$1.4 million to reimburse the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office and Albuquerque Police Department for the work of local law enforcement on the federal task forces supporting Operation Legend's violent crime reduction efforts. The Department has also provided assistance through the Joint Law Enforcement Operations (JLEO) fund to assist reimbursement of local law enforcement serving as federal task force officers with FBI, ATF, DEA, and the U.S. Marshals Service. These JLEO funds also will be used to assist the City of Albuquerque in acquiring technology used for detection of gunshots and development of an integrated response plan to gunshots by local law enforcement.

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
