

Amendment Now In Legislature

PHOENIX (AP) — Consideration of the proposed 22nd amendment to the U. S. constitution is being given in the Arizona Senate.

The measure would limit the tenure of president to a maximum of two terms.

President Warner B. Mattice (D-Graham) referred the proposal to the Senate's suffrages and elections and judiciary committees following its receipt from Gov. Howard Pyle.

Twenty-seven states already have approved the amendment. It takes 36 to ratify. The Wyoming and Arkansas legislatures are expected to act soon.

There are strong indications that six states will not ratify. They are Alabama, Tennessee, Rhode Island, North Carolina, Nevada and Maryland.

Doubtful states are Massachusetts, West Virginia, Texas, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Minnesota, Utah, New Mexico, Georgia and Washington.

The Kentucky legislature does not meet this year.

The 22nd amendment cleared Congress in 1947 with a stipulation it must be approved by the legislatures of 36 states by March 1954 to become law.

At the start of the 20th Arizona legislature last month, House Speaker Raymond G. Langham recommended the amendment be one of the items considered by that group.
