Disclosure Statement

1. Freedom Vote is an Ohio nonprofit corporation which is exempt from federal taxation under section 501(c)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code. Its principal purpose is the promotion of social welfare through issue advocacy.
2. Freedom Vote may accept unlimited contributions from any source, including corporations, trade associations, and labor organizations, but does not accept contributions from foreign nationals.
3. General contributions to Freedom Vote are not required to be publicly disclosed and do not count against an individual's \$117,000 biennial aggregate contribution limit under federal campaign finance law.
4. There are no limitations or restrictions on general contributions to Freedom Vote from individuals or entities that are subject to Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 206(4)-5 or Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board Rule G-37.
5. The IRS does not allow contributions to Freedom Vote to be deducted as a charitable contribution or as a business expense. Contributions to Freedom Vote are not subject to the federal gift tax. Please consult your tax adviser for more details.
